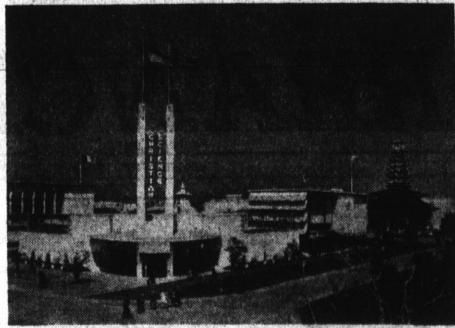

City to Buy New Fire Pump Truck

the basis of one to every two blocks.

"No estimate has yet been made as to the cost of a call box system," Stroth said. When he informed the Board of Fire Underwriters that the city was purchasing a new Mack pumper and asked if the addition of such equipment would bring a reduction in rate classification, he received a letter from John H. Colton, Board engineer, who stated, in part:

Basis for Defense
"The additional pumping capacity will not constitute a material grading improvement inasmuch as your city has not been charged with a deficiency in pumping capacity by our engineers. Deficiencies have been charged, however, for the distribution and quality of outlying companies and their coordination with the Central Station. As you are aware, these facilities are not a rating factor at the present time in the outlying residential areas."

"You are laying a basis, however, for the building of a fire defense system which will eventually improve the National Board classification (for fire insurance rates) of your city according to your progress in strengthening the manpower and operation of companies and improving the receipt of and response to alarms," Colton concluded.

L. A. Attorney's Sudden Death Mourned Here

The tragic death of Marshall Taylor, 42-year-old Los Angeles attorney, Sunday night when his car struck a tree at Avenue 49 and Figueroa street, was mourned by city officials here. They consulted with him several years ago when legal requirements pertaining to the Federal appropriations for the civic center buildings were being followed.

Mr. Taylor was a member of the law firm of O'Melveny, Tuller and Myers, which has been retained by the city of Torrance on several occasions when highly technical legal advice was necessary. He was instantly killed in the accident which wrote a somber finale to a fishing trip at Malibu. The attorney was survived by his widow and a four-year-old daughter.
