WORKING MARRIED WOMEN Mrs. F. D. R. Speaks Her

Mind About Controversy

The controversy about married women working has bobried women working has bob-bed into the news again with the suggestion by Mrs. Frank-lin D. Roosevelt that the best way to combat the legislative trend to har married women from state and local govern-ment is to bring out the "facts."

"Efforts are now being made to find out what the facts are," the President's wife says in the August issue of The Democratic Digest, publication of the Women's Division, Dem-ocratic National Committee, "and once they are verified I think women will have a basis for realistic presentation of the situation of married women as regards employment in general."

The First Lady declares that so far as she knows the num-ber of married women in in-dustry now is "comparatively small," has "very little effect on unemployment" and in most cases the women are en-ranged in work "unsuitable" for men. On the other hand, Mrs. Roosevelt thinks that "a good case" can be made against employing more than ohe member of a family in local, state or federal govern-ment when the salary of one of them provides an adequate standard of living. 


