Dates for English classification and scholastic aptitude tests, required of all students intending to enter the University of Southern California, were announced this week by the S. C. Admissions Office. Examinations for prospective Trojan students will be given at 8:45 a. m. on each Saturday through Sept. 30, in room 206, Administration building. The lowered fee of \$3, established last year when the two tests were combined, may be paid at the Comptroller's office on the day the student takes the examination.

Registration for the fall semester on the Trojan campus will start Sept. 12, when students entering the S. C. junior college will sign up. Entering freshmen will register the following day, with classes beginning on Monday, Sept. 18.

Special events for Freshman Week will include President R. B. von KleinSmid's reception for new students, an all-university dance sponsored by the S. C. student body, and special meetings designed to orient newcomers to the S. C. campus.

The first meeting of the membership will be held in October. To supply funds for the work of the organization the High School P.T.A. will sponsor a donkey baseball game at the city park on the evening of Thursday, Sept. 14. Admission to adults will be 25 cents, children under 15 years, free.
