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140,000 Pencils; 140,000 Erasers Steel Industry's Paper Work Costs Millions

Nearly four million lead pencils are used up by em-ployees of the steel industry in these United States during a year.

And they use nearly 140,000 erasers annually, too—indicat-ing that steel workers make mistakes about as often as the rest of us.

The 2,000 gallons of ink con-The 2,000 galons of the con-sumed in the great volumes of yearly paperwork required in connection with making and selling steel would float sev-eral good-sized rowboats.

eral good-sized rowboats. Pencils, erasers and ink are only minor items, however, in the steel industry's annual bill of \$2,600,000 for miseellaneous office supplies, according to the American Iron and Steel Destinate

the American Iron and Steel. Institute. Nearly 6,500,000 pounds of office paper are purchased in a year, cough to make a pile of standard business letter-head size sheets 41 miles high. To facilitate filing the paper-work, nearly 16,000,000 rubber bands are purchased yearly, and over 100,000,000 paper clips. In buying paper clips the steel industry consumes steel it has previously made. More than 110,000 inked rib-bons for typewriters, adding
