## Fern Ave. P.T.A. Launches Year's Activity Here

The regular monthly meeting of the Fern Avenue P.T.A. was held Tuesday, Sept. 26. Mrs. Roy Meyers lead the pledge of allegiance to the flag, and also read the P.T.A. Collect. The sixth and seventh grades presented three verse choir numbers. Mrs. Mark Melvaine, program chairman, presented Mrs. Billups, new principal of the school to the mothers. Mrs. Billups complimented the unit on its friendliness and introduced the teachers.

Mrs. S. C. Murray, president of the Lomita-San Pedro council, spoke on plans and responsibilities of the organization for the year. Mrs. Murray said membership of the National Congress of Parent Teachers last year was 2,200,000 and the state membership was 240,506, and the Lomita-San Pedro had 2,238 members. The P.T.A. hopes to enlarge the membership this year. Dedicated to child welfare, the organization has 12 departments working for the good of the child, with each department divided into smaller divisions.

Mrs. J. J. Millard next spoke on "More Ethos from the Convention." She compared the P.T.A. to a neighborhood club where "recipes and plans of living" are exchanged. Mrs. Millard also explained the "Life Membership Fund." In the ten years from 1929 to 1939 the state P.T.A. received \$74,000 from this fund to 381 students who need financial aid to attend college. A total of 181 of these students are still in school, and 49 have paid back their loans in full. The P.T.A. hopes to have 200,000 available this fall. Life memberships are \$25.

Mrs. Millard read a report from the district welfare department showing that the community chest had paid \$91 to help for the Fern Avenue children last year. A business meeting followed and tea was served by Mrs. A. C. Turner.

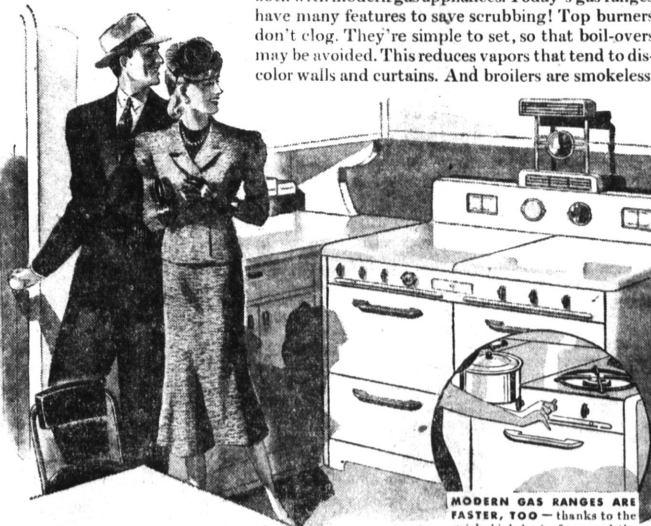

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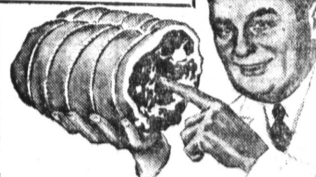
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
