Altar Frames Bridal Party on Saturday

The stately cardinal red canopy which adorns the altar at the Catholic Church of the Nativity was softened by the addition of tall tropical ferns and lighted by cathedral candles to provide a striking setting for the marriage Saturday morning of Mary Elizabeth McNeil and Aaron L. Preceding the Mass, a group of organ selections were played and later Miss Tomasina Rebecca sang "Ave Maria" by Schubert and "Panis Angelicus" by Strack, accompanied by Miss Mary Scallen.

The bride, who was given in marriage by her father, wore a striking model of white moire, princess style with bustle effect, short sleeves with long tight fitted mittens of moire that were removed later. A tiara of gardenias held her finger veil of white tulle in place, and she carried a white prayer book with a shower of Phoebe orchids.

The mother of the bride wore a sea blue crepe dress with a corsage of blending gladiolus of grey pink shades with a center of hybrid delphiniums.

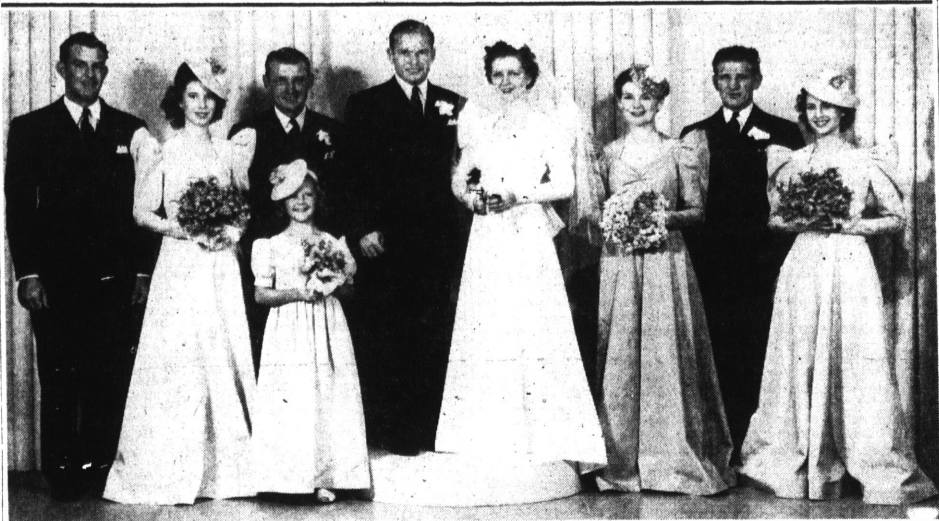
