

Tartars Begin Defense of Marine Grid Title at Banning Friday

**FIRST GAME
KICKOFF AT
3 O'CLOCK**

Defeated in their two practice games, the Torrance Tartars are in no mood for trifling today as they tapered off for the opening tomorrow (Friday) afternoon of the 1939 Marine league football season. They will go to Banning high's field in Wilmington as underdogs.

But sub-pups have an uncanny faculty of tripping their favored opponents and Tartar rooters are hoping for a victory by the time the sun dips into the Pacific tomorrow evening. The kickoff is at 3 o'clock.

If anything else than Coach Robert Barr's stiff rehearsals of fundamentals combined with some bruising scrimmage this week is needed to spur the fair-to-middling Tartars to some of their 1938 spirit, recollection of last year's Banning game should provide it. It was on Oct. 28, 1938, that Torrance scored its first grid victory in two years, nosing out Banning 7 to 0.

Lose to South Gate
The hero in that game, Marvin Gottsch, will be on the sidelines tomorrow. He is over the 19-year age limit. But Akige Shimatsu, who dived over center for the score last year, is in the Tartar line-up again. So is Charles Grubb, Kenneth Perkins and Peckham. And there's other good material in the Torrance squad, huskies who are capable of holding Banning and even grabbing off a few points.

But last Friday's game at South Gate showed that the local squad is still far from becoming the efficient, fighting machine that Coach Barr turned out his first season here. South Gate scored a touchdown in the second quarter and two in the third period to whip Torrance 18 to 2 in the practice tilt. The Tartars counted a safety in the final quarter for their only score.

Narbonne at San Pedro
Banning is touted as the strongest contender in the Marine league this year to take the championship away from Torrance. However, Narbonne high, which meets San Pedro at the port city tomorrow, has shown surprising power in two practice wins under Coach Bill Sloan. The Gauchos tangle with Torrance Oct. 27 on the local field. Gardena draws a bye this week and doesn't swing into the Marine campaign until Oct. 7 by playing at San Pedro.

The Narbonne-San Pedro game should be a superior tussle. Last year the Pirates went to Lomita heavily favored and came back home beaten. Torrance opened the 1938 campaign by losing to Gardena 18 to 7.

Coached by Gus Gerson, the Banning Pilots have had about the same luck as the Tartars in practice tilts this fall. They eked out a scoreless tie with Bell, and lost to South Gate 15 to 0 and to Venice last Friday, 26 to 6.

In the annual "big game" in Southern California junior college grid ranks, Compton and Pasadena jaycees will clash Friday night in the Rose Bowl. The two colleges are arch-rivals in athletic combats and both elevens have been pointing to their Rose Bowl engagement since the start of the season. The Pasadena Bulldogs will enter the tilt conceding a slight edge. The kickoff is at 8 p. m.

Last year, 45,000 people viewed the Tartar-Bulldog clash, which was won by Pasadena, 20-7. The 1938 audience was the largest crowd ever to witness a junior college grid tilt in America. Officials of the two colleges predict that a new attendance mark may be set Friday night with preparations being made to handle a crowd of 50,000.

Narbonne's Gauchos, who open their Marine league campaign at San Pedro tomorrow afternoon, took a 26 to 0 victory over Dorsey high last Friday in the final practice game of the season. Milo Roberts, line-plunging Gaucha quarterback, sparked the Lomita contingent to its win.

Packing the ball almost every time, Roberts advanced 80 yards to the Dorsey 3-yard marker, from which point Harry Hagedorn, who replaced Roberts, scored the first touchdown in the opening quarter. Roberts later passed to Bob Beckley for 23 yards and another Lomita score in the third period.

NEW LAW ON SEA FISHING

Deep-sea sport fishermen are advised that a new fish and game law now in effect establishes a possession limit of 15 ocean game fish in any 24-hour period.

Included in the game fish category are bluefin tuna, yellowfin tuna, skipjack, yellowtail, marlin, broadbill, swordfish, black sea bass, albacore, barracuda, white sea bass, bonito, rock bass, kelp bass, California halibut, California corbina, yellowfin croaker, and spotfin croaker.

Fish not included in the 15 limit are mackerel, sheepshead, rockfish, smelt, perch, ocean whiting, sand dabs and sculpin. The law also applies to any person holding a commercial fishing license while on any barge or boat which carries any sport fishermen for hire.
