Narbonne Shows Power at S. P.

Revealing power and an ability to cash in on the breaks, Narbonne's well-knit football machine started its march to the 1939 Marine league title last Friday by conquering San Pedro 6 to 0 at the port city before a crowd of some 6,000 fans.

The Gauchos scored the winning and only touchdown in the third quarter after the lighter Pirate eleven had managed to hold them to a deadlock in the first half.

The score came on the end of a 54-yard drive, broken only by a fumble and continuing after a poor San Pedro kick had gained but one yard. With Driscoll Truitt back for a field goal, Henry Binkley took the ball on a quarterback sneak and dived two yards for the touchdown.

Referee Injured
 Credit must be given San Pedro's Roy Providence for his fighting spirit that gave the Gauchos some bad moments. Providence, who received a leg injury in the week previous in the Cathedral practice game, was out of the opening lineup but when the Narbonne tackle smashes gained consistently, the Pirate captain forgot his injury and came in to turn in one of the best games of his career.

Hagedorn, who replaced Roberts in the first quarter and alternated carrying the ball for the Narbonne, did most of that team's ground gaining. Narbonne rolled up seven first downs while San Pedro failed to make yardage once. Alto players from both squads were badly battered and bruised, there were no serious injuries reported.

The only casualty of the game was Referee James Purcell who was carried from the field in the third quarter with a sprained ankle. He was hurt in one of the Gaucha thrusts at San Pedro's line. Frank Patalano filled in for the injured official.

San Pedro Bees Crush Lomitan

San Pedro's Class B football team, scoring almost at will, sailed to an easy 37 to 7 victory over the Narbonne lightweights in the first Marine league encounter at Lomita last Thursday afternoon. Completely overpowered, the Gaucha Bees made its only score in the closing minutes of the game when Ishikawa nabbed a kickoff and ran it back 85 yards to a touchdown.

Coach Holly Adams of San Pedro used all 47 players on his squad in the game, each team getting at least one tally. The tilt was the only Class B game of the league. Narbonne's line-up started out with Van Mulligan, left end; Cheek, left tackle; Bailey, left guard; Fort, center; Goss, right guard; Guthrie, right tackle; Borgan, right end; Kubow, quarterback; Ishikawa, left half; Mince, right half, and Bowman, fullback.

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COACH BARR SAYS OUTCOME DEPENDS ON TEAM SPIRIT

Tomorrow afternoon, Narbonne's Gauchos who tripped San Pedro last week as the Marine league grid season got under way, will invade Torrance high school's field determined to hand the Tartars another loss. Whether they will succeed in this local version of the blitzkrieg depends on the morale of the Torrance gridders.

Coach Bob Barr saw plenty room for improvement among his Torrance varsity last Friday when Banning trounced them 12 to 7. Throughout the week he has been drilling the Tartars within an inch of their young lives and today declares that the outcome rests entirely with his men.

"They've had the best I can give them. Now it's up to them. They can take the Gauchos if they get in and dig," he said.

The kickoff will be at 3 o'clock and because a Torrance-Narbonne game is regarded as the local gridders' feature engagement of the grid season, several thousand spectators are expected to be on hand for the battle.

Few Inspired Moments
 Last Friday the Tartars suffered from "too much Capt. Harry Stine." That Banning leader starred in the attack on the local squad, scoring touchdowns in the second and fourth quarters. Stine ran 12 yards for the first score and used the same play, a reverse followed by a lateral, for nine yards and the final tally.

The Tartars scored in the final period when Kenneth Perkin intercepted a pass on the Banning 40 and ran it to the 28-yard line. A pass, Perkin to Justice, put the ball on the 10-yard stripe and Perkin went over from the one-yard line on the fourth down.

The Torrance play was ragged to the point of downright clumsiness at times and then, sparked up, the Tartars appeared to have regained their old time fight. But those inspired moments were few and far between.

McGahan, Tartar Pitcher, Has Splendid Record
 Elmer McGahan, 19-year-old pitcher who started his diamond career playing for Torrance high school, is now hurling for the North Long Beach Merchants.

Last Sunday he pitched that club to a 3 to 0 victory over Pacific Construction at Houghton Park in Long Beach.

McGahan, who came to Torrance high from Jordan, was the property of the Hollywood Stars two years ago. Then he was given an outright release after being farmed to Bellingham, Wash. He held the Construction nine to three hits, two singles and a double, and struck out 12.

McGahan is reported to have attracted the interest of major league clubs, having struck out four out of every 10 men to face him in the past four months.

Billy Dillon of Lomita twisted his ankle and chipped a bone while practicing pole vaulting at University of Notre Dame in South Bend, Ind., about two weeks ago. It was learned this week from Track Coach Joseph P. Nicholson in a letter to Robert Lewellen of this city.
