## County Library, Which Serves Torrance, Reports Activities

There are 145,976 book borrowers (2,700 in Torrance) on the rolls of the Los Angeles County Public Library system. It is revealed in the annual report of Helen E. Voglesoh, county librarian, now on file with the Board of Supervisors.

This is a gain of 5,604 for the year or four percent despite the fact that more than 11,000 persons were withdrawn from the rolls when the City of Burbank dropped from the County Library system last year, the report stated. There also was a gain of three percent in number of books circulated during the year. Total circulation was 3,259,112, a gain of 104,272.

The local increase in library patrons amounted to about 100 over the 1938 figure, according to Mrs. Dorothy Jamieson, li-

brarian. The Torrance library circulated 57,683 books during the fiscal year of 1938-39, an increase of 8,900 over the previous year's total.

Mrs. Jamieson said that the local book and periodical center maintains a fluid stock of about 10,000 volumes, including 600 which are frequently changed at the Waleria branch.

Regarded as one of the largest library systems of the world, the Los Angeles County Library now maintains a main office in Los Angeles City and 134 branches in all sections of the county. It serves an area of 3,461.04 square miles. Branches are located in 12 library buildings, seven institutions, 43 schools and in 57 rented quarters.

Miss Voglesoh's report stated that 48,440 volumes were added to the library's stock of books during the year bringing total volume to 564,342 after deducting 19,719 volumes lost or withdrawn.

Cost of operation of the system in the last fiscal year totaled \$397,227. This included \$237,496 for salaries and \$81,049-51 for books.

Battle of Lexington  
Was Page 2 News

PHILADELPHIA (U. P.) — Start of the American Revolutionary War was only page two news in the Pennsylvania Journal, old files of the newspaper disclose.

"The King's troops are actually engaged in butchering and destroying our brethren in the most inhuman manner," the Journal said in a second page item regarding the Battle of Lexington.

A letter under the item described how well-drilled British troops of "about 1,000 or 1,200 men landed at Phipps Farm at Cambridge and marched to Lexington" in search of John Hancock and Samuel Adams. The redcoats killed eight of "our Colony Militia" and wounded nine, according to the letter, which reached Philadelphia five days later.

The original United States, as constituted after the Revolutionary war, took in all present territory from the Atlantic to the Mississippi, except Florida.

## FIRST ANNIVERSARY FETED AT DINNER

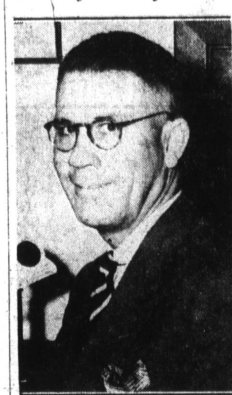
