Murray Lauds U.S. Steel for Job Agreement

Steele said. A Mr. Phillips, international representative of the C.I.O. oil workers' union, urged affirmative votes on Proposition No. 5 at the Nov. 7 election, declaring it was "labor's law and its defeat will take away many jobs."

Giant of Industry
Murray proved to be a most interesting speaker. His excellent voice and authoritative manner lent conviction to his statements concerning the progress of labor. He described his work in the C.I.O. and in the Steel Workers' Organizing Committee which he abbreviated to "Swoc." As vice-president of the United Mine Workers of America and right-hand man of John L. Lewis, Murray has been chairman of SWOC since its founding June 17, 1936.

He declared that C.I.O. and SWOC were the first organization of workers to unionize the steel industry which had successfully resisted such efforts for "more than 50 years." Murray paid tribute to the size of the steel industry—"it is a giant, having 875,000 employees and is the largest single basic industry in the U. S. It is controlled by a well-organized group of financiers, representing some 12 billion dollars of capital."

"Organization of SWOC was effected over strenuous odds by constant application, well-directed campaigns and expenditure of considerable money," he continued. "You people here are far removed from the center of activities in the Midwest and East and perhaps you don't get information on the kind of work SWOC is doing in this country. Do you know we have almost 1,200 lodges in the United States and Canada and they have over 11,000 officers and 8,200 grievance committeemen to adjudicate in peaceful fashion all disputes arising under collective bargaining agreements?"

"We have negotiated 619 corporation and company agreements covering 650,000 men and women alone covering 224,000 employees of U. S. Steel and its subsidiaries. It took five or six months of hard work creating and setting up our organization after its founding. We had to design and perfect an educational campaign to assure workers they would not lose their jobs by supporting SWOC. We were helped greatly by the National Labor Relations Act," Murray declared.

The visiting labor official described efforts made by the C. I. O., to unionize Bethlehem, Republic and National Steel and asserted that the pending case before the U. S. court of Appeals regarding reinstatement of Republic Steel strikers would be a milestone in the history of the labor movement, involving as it does a claim (countered by the firm for a like amount) by the C.I.O., of \$7,500,000 in back wages.

"We're not interested in promoting strikes in the steel industry," Murray asserted. "Our principal interest is to develop a strong, healthy organization for the protection of all workers. SWOC is one of 42 international unions affiliated with C.I.O. The cure for all labor evils and ailments lies in the hands of the workers' organization and the welfare of the nation depends on your willingness to help organize the unorganized."

NAME NEW C.I.O. LEADERS IN S. C.

President Carl Steele announced yesterday that Tom Riffe, SWOC director in the Chicago area, had replaced William Dalrymple as field director for the labor organization in California. At the same time, James Timmes was appointed field director for Southern California. Timmes, who has been working in the Gary, Ind., district, is well-known to members of the local C.I.O. lodge and officials of Columbia Steel, the Torrance lodge leader said.
