Paul's words to the Ephesians, "Awake thou that sleepest, and arise from the dead, and Christ shall give thee light," are the Golden Text in the Lesson-Sermon on "Adam and Fallen Man" on Sunday in all Churches of Christ, Scientist. A Scriptural selection includes these verses about Jesus from Luke: "And behold, men brought in a bed a man which was taken with a palsy: . . . And when he saw their faith, he said unto him, Man, thy sins are forgiven thee. And the scribes and the Pharisees began to reason, saying, Who is this which speaketh blasphemies? Who can forgive sins, but God alone? But when Jesus perceived their thoughts, he answering said unto them, What reason ye in your hearts? Whether is easier, to say, Thy sins be forgiven thee; or to say, Rise up and walk? But that ye may know that the Son of man hath power upon earth to forgive sins, (he said unto the sick of the palsy,) I say unto thee, Arise, and take up thy couch, and go into thine house. And immediately he rose up before them, and took up that whereon he lay, and departed to his own house, glorifying God."

One of the passages from "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures" by Mary Baker Eddy states: "Christ, Truth, was demonstrated through Jesus to prove the power of Spirit over the flesh, to show that Truth is made manifest by its effects upon the human mind and body, healing sickness and destroying sin."

JOHN HURLIN . . . a resident of Lomita for more than 25 years, passed away last Wednesday at a Los Angeles rest home at the age of 88 years. Funeral service was held Friday afternoon at the A. M. Gamby chapel in Lomita. Mr. Hurlin was a retired rancher and member of the Modern Woodmen of America. He was survived by three daughters, Mrs. Martin Nelson of Lomita, Mrs. C. A. Johnson of Los Angeles and Mrs. Victor Iodini of Illinois. Interment was at Roosevelt Memorial park.

MRS. MARGARET E. WILLIAMS . . . passed away Sunday at her home, 1724 Martina avenue following a lingering illness. She was 59 years of age and a resident of this city for 11 years. Her husband, whose name is honored by the local S.W.O.C. lodge, succumbed suddenly about a year ago this month.

Mrs. Williams is survived by two sons, Charles E., with whom she made her home, and William E. Williams of Martins Ferry, Ohio, and four daughters, Mrs. Charles Fulton, Mrs. Ernest Ash-ton, Mrs. Loren Maddox and Mrs. David Hogan, all of this city. Funeral service was held at Stone and Myers' chapel yesterday afternoon with Rev. Harry G. Banks officiating. The body has been sent to Martins Ferry for interment.

ALVIN BENJAMIN PADDOCK . . . who came to Lomita in 1911 with his parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. Job A. Paddock, succumbed last Friday at his home in Inglewood. Seriously injured five years ago last February, he amazed doctors and friends by his fight for health and his remarkable patience during his long suffering. An all-around athlete as a boy, his tremendous vitality showed in his long battle against hopeless odds. He was born in Mankato, Minn., Aug. 10, 1889 and came with his parents to Riverside at the age of six.

During the World War he was stationed at Camp Lewis, Washington, and was honorably discharged from the U. S. Army in April, 1919. Until recent years he was employed in the wholesale plumbing business in Los Angeles. Seventeen years ago on Oct. 5 he married Helen Sten, whose devoted care during his long illness made it possible for him to endure his sufferings.

His parents, one sister, Ida May Hislop, and a brother, Frank A. Paddock, preceded him in death. Mr. Paddock was survived by his wife, two sisters, Rosella P. Strachan and Birda Paddock of Lomita, and a brother, John J. Paddock of Los Angeles. Funeral service was conducted Monday at Inglewood with Rev. Clyde McNelly officiating. He was buried with full military rites in Inglewood cemetery with Inglewood American Legion post No. 188, in charge.

Attebery's Known for Good Food

Founded on the three cardinal principles of better eating places—good food, good service and attractive surroundings—Attebery's Ranch House is becoming a banquet center at 4010 Sepulveda boulevard just off Hawthorne avenue. During a recent 10-day period, Mrs. Martha E. Attebery served three different dinner groups of more than 50 each.

"People like good food and plenty of it," she said this week as she whipped up a batch of her delicious old-fashioned Southern butterbiscuits—not the little dabs of dough usually found forlornly on a plate beside what is said to be fried chicken—but real, he-man's size fluffy confections.

"We started serving luncheons and dinners last April in our home and our business has been showing a steady increase ever since. Mr. Attebery and I have lived here since 1914 and we raise our own chickens. We believe they are the best in Southern California because we raise them in batteries—not a chicken ever touches the ground. I feed them so that the meat is just right when it is properly cooked."

The Attebery Ranch House can accommodate 60 in the main room and right now Mrs. Attebery is planning to seat 12 more in what has been used as the lounge or waiting room.

MASTER PLAN DETAILS DUE

Mayors and officials of all cities of the county will be invited to hear on November 15 details of the "Los Angeles County Master Plan of Development," which is declared to be of such vast scope that it includes practically every major activity contributing to the future growth of this district.

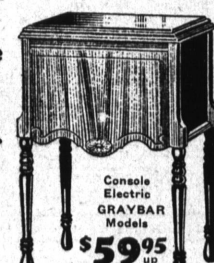
