Five of Narbonne high's championship Gauchos were awarded places on the All-Marine League eleven as chosen last week in a poll of coaches. San Pedro's second place team put two men on the mythical stellar squad as did Gardena and Banning high.

Cage Season Opens Friday for 6 Schools

Basketball will make its official entry on the Marine League stage of sports tomorrow when six teams will open a 30-game schedule. Contests are set for each Friday afternoon until Jan. 9 when Tuesday games will also be played. El Segundo, dark-horse entry in the circuit, is included in the schedule.

Torrance opens the casaba circuit playing at Narbonne tomorrow afternoon. The Class B games will precede the varsity clashes and will start at 2:20 p. m.

A double round will be played with teams meeting each other on each home floor. The schedule will be completed Jan. 26. San Pedro and Banning, co-champions of last year's race, will be defending the title and both are reported to have strong aggregations.

El Segundo, out of football in the league, returns for the cage sport and should be a serious contender for both A and B championships. Pete Zamperini has his Torrance five at top form and Coach Wayne Schloss has been drilling his Narbonne Gauchos to peak condition for the season.

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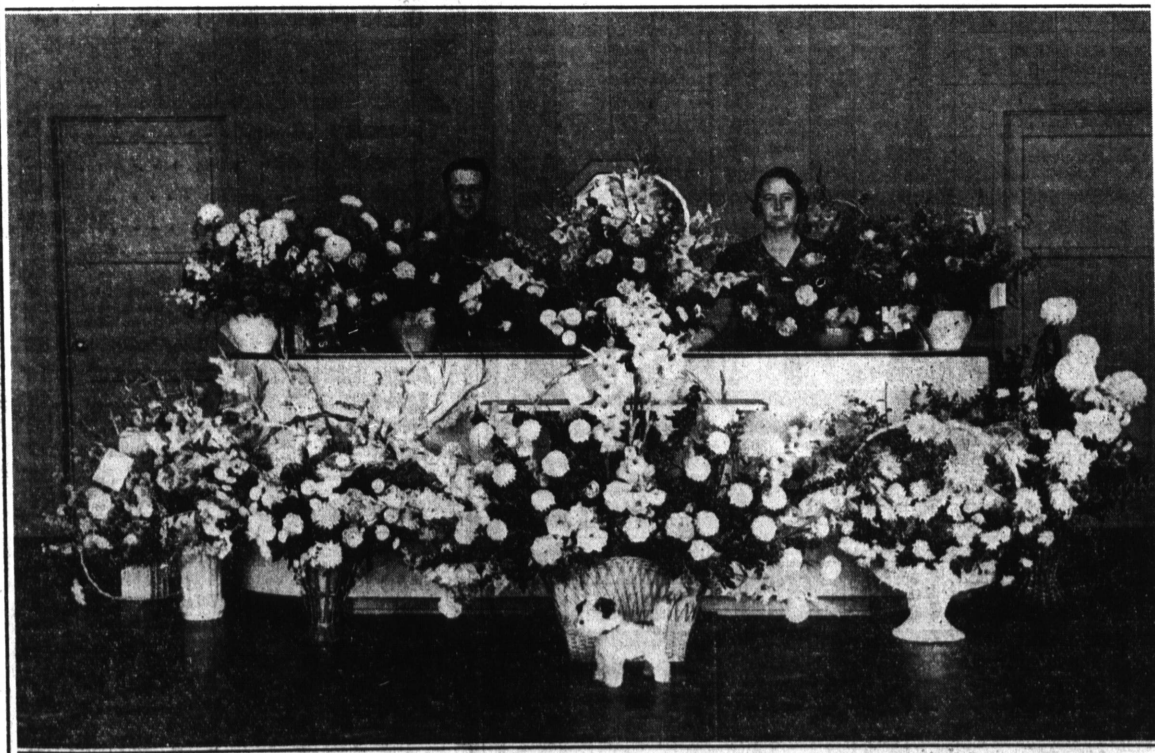
