

Postal Workers Facing Floods of Mail Soon

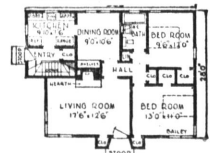

With the City Council

(Continued from Page 1-B) submits a proposed ordinance adopting the uniform method of marking highways with distinctive paint stripes to control traffic, the city council will adopt it for local use, it was indicated Tuesday night. The council went on record as favoring the uniform markings at the request of the state division.

WIDEN HAWTHORNE . . . Engineer Young was authorized to contact the state highway department to find out what it would cost to have a right-of-way man go over the route on Hawthorne avenue north from Torrance boulevard to Redondo Beach boulevard and obtain deeds to make that avenue uniformly 100 feet wide. The cost of obtaining the necessary right-of-way is believed to be about \$1,000. Young informed the council that about \$14,884 was available now from the city's gasoline tax funds to help pay for the widening improvement. He said the 100-foot right-of-way should be obtained before the city undertakes to improve the shoulders on Hawthorne.

AWAIT STORM . . . No further action will be taken by the city to improve drainage conditions at 231st and Narbonne until the next storm proves that present dry wells there are inadequate. Engineer Young told the council that because of soil conditions, it would be most expensive to sink 60-foot wells there. Diggers believe 40-foot holes would drain the intersection, he said, but he recommended waiting until the next storm to see if new ones are needed.

MOTOR AND SPRINKLERS . . . Appropriations totaling \$745.15 were approved by the

Afterwards the man drove back to highway 101 and ordered the crying child out of the car. He then drove off — the child said Monday night he went toward Redondo but when questioned Tuesday morning said it was toward Lomita.

Refined in Welteria . . . The wife of the auto court owner found the little girl crying bitterly and questioned her. But the distraught youngster could not even tell her own name or her address. All she knew was her teacher's name. At this point police were called and began a check-up of the schools. The teacher was located at the Lomita Elementary school and said that the little girl's mother, worried over her absence, had just left in a search of the neighborhood. Special Officer Harry Slover was detailed from the Torrance station to return the girl to her home.

When he called at the auto court to get her, the little girl attempted to run away from him and cried so much that the wife of the court owner accompanied Slover and the child home. Because of the youngster's nervousness, continued weeping and incoherent statements about a man "who hurt me" the mother took her daughter to a Lomita physician's office.

Haven't Much to go On . . . The doctor confirmed the mother's worst fears and the man-hunt for the degenerate was set in motion immediately.

The sheriff's office was notified and sent two deputies to Torrance to assist in the investigation.

Lawndale Pair Nabbed for Spree

Two Lawndale residents, Elizabeth and A. L. Blake, 26 and 29 years of age respectively, were arrested by local police in Welteria Sunday and charged with being drunk in an auto. Blake was fined \$15 after he pleaded guilty and Mrs. Blake, who first asserted her innocence and had her trial set for Dec. 4, later changed her mind and entered the same plea. She was given a \$25 suspended fine.

Officers . . . The child's parents and the little girl "backtracked" over as much of the man's route as the youngster could remember but no one they questioned remembered seeing the girl or the man.

"We are continuing to check on a few leads," Police Chief Stroh said yesterday, "but because of the child's age and her nervous condition we haven't got much to go on."

Appeals for Information . . . Stroh appealed to all readers of this newspaper to contact his office — the phone is Torrance 400 — at once if they can offer any lead to the case. The child believes the man was white, said he wore dark glasses and that he drove a tan or brown sedan or coach-type car. But that is as much identification as she can give, police said.

"We want that fiend and we want him bad," Stroh declared. "We have checked with Redondo Beach police and deputy sheriffs on a similar case they had in the county strip near that city but have not received any information which will help us with this crime."
