

Herald Gets Good News From Finns:

WAR DISRUPTS FINLAND'S GREAT PAPER INDUSTRY

Not so long ago the very paper you are reading was part of Finland's vast forests. Perhaps it was even made from the pulp of a tree that grew where the Finns are gallantly staving off a crushing invasion of Soviet Russia's Red soldiers.

Early this week the Herald received a letter from the paper company which has been supplying us with Finnish newsprint. That letter brought the war very close to home. It said:

"On account of the situation in Finland, shipments of newsprint from that country are no longer possible. The mill has been closed down and the workers have been called to the defense of their country. No paper is on the way, the next shipment is, however, ready at the mill and we know that the company is making all possible efforts to effect shipment of this lot."

Reading Between Words

Yesterday, however, the following cable was received from Stockholm: "Endeavoring to con-

tinue shipments. Machines again running."

It isn't hard to read between the seven words of that welcome message. Altho it is most encouraging to this newspaper to know that there is a possibility of getting continued shipments of Finland's excellent newsprint, it is heartening to know that Finland's warriors have been released from service to the extent that the great mills are again rolling. Evidently that nation's glorious defense of its political integrity, aided by winter's chilling grip, has at least temporarily halted the Russian horde.

The Herald has used Finnish newsprint for several reasons. One is that the American supply is very limited and the other is that Finnish paper is recognized as superior to any produced elsewhere in the world. It has an excellent finish, so necessary for good reproduction of halftones (pictures) and it is strong capable of standing the "pull"
