If Lily Pons had gone through high school and passed in algebra, chemistry, cooking, history, sewing, physics, biology, ancient history and gymnastics, would she have had any time left to study and to practice singing?

I am sure I don't know. But I do feel that a real genius must strike his individual note early in life, between the ages of twelve and twenty-two.

Robert Frost, himself a poetical genius, declares: "Schools and colleges have been conducted for the almost expressed purpose of keeping him (the real poet) busy with something else until the danger of his ever creating anything is passed. Their motto has been: 'The muses find some mischief still for idle hands to do.'"

If I had a little girl who could draw, would I encourage her drawing and let the fractions slide? If she could sing, would I have her cry over her algebra or let her practice her music? If my fifteen-year-old boy saw only bugs, snakes, trees and polly-wogs, would I shut him up in his room until he had mastered

I know it is nice to know a little about everything and to be well-informed on the present, past and future of history, science, economics, literature, languages, art, music, grammar, physics, chemistry, mathematics, cooking, sewing, agriculture, physical training, Greek, Latin, French, German and all the other things which young people may gather together in sufficient amount to receive a diploma.

But I also know that it is just as nice, and even nicer, to master something which is born within us, and to express our life through it. It seems to me that many boys and girls in high schools and colleges are getting what is called a "well-rounded education" whereas they show great aptitude for art, music, writing, science or drama.

Stressing One's Forte

If I had a daughter who apparently could play the violin very well, I would discover as

quickly as I could whether she was a genius. If she was not, her violin would be a great pleasure in her hours of leisure. If she was a genius she would drop all her studies except English, physical training, and foreign languages.

If I had a son who was crazy over bugs, who thought a great deal of Louis Agassiz, and could draw birds as could Louis Pasteur, he would, as far as I was concerned, never get a look into a book on geometry, algebra or ancient history.

He might live to curse me. And he might live to bless me.

HE CARES VERY MUCH

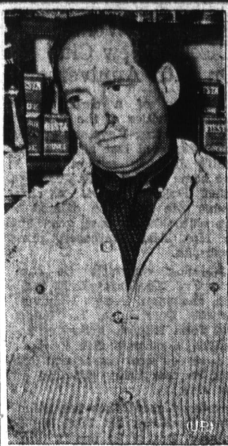
