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# Local Reader Finds Error in City Names in Satevepost Article; Gets Apology from Author

Huntington Beach may like its screen entertainment in gushers but Huntington Park reads its periodicals with only casual interest.

It remained for a Torrance resident, Charles A. Curtiss, secretary of the Dominguez Land Corporation, to point out an error involving those two cities that appeared in one of the series of "Letters" by Catherine Hayes Brown, mother of Helen Hayes, that appeared in the Saturday Evening Post of Dec. 30.

So far as it is known, up to Jan. 9, no resident of Huntington Park, victim of the error, had protested or sought a correction from the author. Mrs. Brown had stated in the Dec. 30 installment of her absorbing "Letters" that when Miss Hayes' motion picture of Barrie's "What Every Woman Knows" was previewed "in Huntington Park" the "oil workers" who comprised most of the audience jeered it.

The companion feature on the bill was a Jean Harlow "gusher" which received great applause. But the more reserved offering by Miss Hayes was greeted by catcalls, feet stampings and Bronx cheers.

Catches Mistake in Names  
Writing Dec. 27, 1939 to the editors of the Satevepost, Curtiss stated:

"Dear Sir: I have just finished reading the Helen Hayes articles and have enjoyed them immensely as I always enjoyed Helen Hayes' stage performance.

"At this time I wish to call your attention to the Dec. 30 article in which the author states 'What Every Woman Knows' was previewed at Huntington Park, Calif., and further states the audiences there are made up mostly of oil workers. She evidently intended to refer to Huntington Beach as the residents of Huntington Park will resent this confusion of names with the implication of the type of audience and no doubt have already expressed themselves.

Admits Apology Due  
He received this reply: "Dear Mr. Curtiss: When an author's facts are challenged it is our custom to give him first chance to reply. Accordingly we are forwarding your letter to Catherine Hayes Brown with the request that she answer it. Meanwhile, allow us to thank you for her behalf for your compliments on her series.

And a few days later, Curtiss opened this cordial letter from Mrs. Brown, dated Jan. 9:

"My dear Mr. Curtiss: Your letter to the editor to the Saturday Evening Post has just been forwarded to me. Indeed, indeed, I do owe Huntington Park a sincere apology. Of course it was Huntington Beach where this humiliating thing happened to Helen Hayes.

Too Late Even for Book  
"I must explain to you that when I started these 'Letters' they were never intended for any other eyes but my grand-daughters, when I was gone from this world. Therefore, while I was as accurate as I possibly could be about dates and places, I still wasn't as careful as I might have been had I expected them to be seen by other eyes.

"Strangely enough, even when the galley proofs were sent to me I did not notice my error. Would it be possible to have this apology appear in a Huntington Park paper? This is the only way I can make amends for my mistake.

Local police on learning the last three numbers of the suspect's car license obtained information from the Department of Motor Vehicles that the truck was registered to M. E. Taylor and Sons of Long Beach.

Police in that city were asked to check with the Taylor firm but before a patrol officer reached the address, two special police officers in that city reported they saw the truck pull up on the car lot used to store the Taylor's machines. The driver jumped from the truck and ran.

Three Suspects Released  
They tried to catch him but he again eluded capture. A black sweater was found in the cab of the machine and a headlight was shattered. The broken light corresponded with pieces of glass found where Miss Buckley and Leslie were run down, police said.

Investigation by Long Beach officers centered around three suspects but they were all released later after giving satisfactory alibis. Police Chief Stroth said today that his department is working on several other angles of the hit-and-run case and also that the Long Beach and sheriff's departments were cooperating.

International Interested

In addition to the vocational meetings, the committee has established and maintains a "Rotary Bookshelf" in the high school library. Books, pamphlets, catalogues and other printed matter are furnished by Rotarians pertaining to their own lines of work for the information of the students.

The Rotary club has been called upon for a report on this library project at the district conference and Rotary International has lately asked for complete information on the whole Vocational Guidance project, according to Chairman Howe.
