

Banning Cinches League Basketball Championship; 4 Games to Go

San Pedro and Segundo Racing for 2nd Place

Still going like a house afire and with Big Dick Frey, center, outscoring all other League hoopers, Banning high school's Pilots won the Marine League basketball championship this week although they still have four more games to play. Banning has run up six straight wins.

The race for second place lies between San Pedro and El Segundo with Torrance having a bare chance to get up there if the Tartars find themselves a team once more.

Tuesday afternoon Banning defeated a fighting Gardena outfit, 53 to 41; San Pedro crushed a rattled Torrance quintet, 37 to 22, and El Segundo tamed Narbonne 23 to 18.

The Marine League season is scheduled to end Friday, Jan. 26 with Banning and El Segundo playing their postponed engagement of Dec. 1, 1939 after that date.
