FILM PRESENTS CONQUEST OF ATLANTIC BY STEAMSHIP

The heroic struggle to conquer the Atlantic by a ship powered with steam, set in motion by the salty, red-blooded men and women with the courage to bring a dream to triumphant realization, is gloriously told in the new Frank Lloyd production, "Rulers of the Sea," now showing at the Lomita Theatre.

Bill Stewart, California state interscholastic high jump champion in 1939, has cleared the bar at 6 ft. 7½ in. but he failed to leap away from Old Man Bad Luck.

Shortly after Christmas, Stewart, one of the most promising high-jumpers on the Coast, underwent an operation to remove the damaged piece of cartilage in his left knee—the one that bears his weight on landing.

But infection set in and he was forced to return for further treatment. Now he has just recently been released from the hospital but his leaping is over for the remainder of the year. Villain to Stride Stage for P.T.A. on March 1

Extra! Jealous no doubt of a successful melodrama that has been playing to full houses for years, the Narbonne P. T. A. is starting rehearsals for a play to be given March 1.

The Narbonne P. T. A. will present "Curses! The Villain is Foiled!" and the few in the know as to script and cast say it is a blood-curdling thriller with an all-star cast.

Other features of the program, which is a benefit for Narbonne P. T. A., will be Scotch songs by the faculty's Harry Lander, James Van Fatten, and to offset the chills caused by the play, June Lindgren will give some flute solos.

It is also rumored that granddaughters of the original Floradora Sextette will appear in their grandmothers' costumes.

County Budget Top Heavy by Million Dollars

Expenditures totaling approximately \$1,000,000 for items not in this year's county budget will appear in the 1940-41 budget now in preparation, according to county budget experts now working out preliminary details for Wayne Allen, chief administrative officer for the board of supervisors.

This will mean that severe retrenchments must be made in other items, sufficient to offset these increases, or the supervisors will be forced to raise the general county levy which is \$1.4973 this year. And it requires nearly four cents on the general levy to raise \$1,000,000 in revenue.

Three items alone constitute the threatened \$1,000,000 budget increase. One is the five-step salary plan whereby some 12,000 county employees recently were pledged pay increases by the board of supervisors. This would require between \$200,000 and \$400,000 more for next year than this year in the salary budget.

Can Rescind Increases
The presidential primary, the state primary and the general election next November, plus an increase of nearly 500 in number of election precincts accounts for nearly \$375,000. And the supervisors have agreed to pay election board officials \$8 for their services at elections this year, and \$8 for polling place rental, instead of \$5 as has been done some years. All this amounts to some \$25,000.

Increase in the county's normal welfare loan and in General Hospital costs have been estimated at about \$250,000. This extra cost, like election costs, must be met, although the supervisors could harken to protests of taxpayers and rescind any and all pay boosts, experts say.

Public hearings on next year's budget are scheduled to begin on June 10 and the final budget is to be adopted before June 30.
