

# Track and Baseball Enter Spotlight in Marine League High Schools

## BANNING ROMPS OFF WITH BASKETBALL CHAMPIONSHIP

With Banning running off unstopped with the championship, basketball bowed off the Marine League sports stage last Friday afternoon and the spotlight was promptly focused on track and baseball.

San Pedro's Class B hoopsters grabbed the league title in basketball while their heavier fellow basketballers placed second in league standings. El Segundo's Oilers who still have a scheduled post-season game to play with the Banning champs, took third, Torrance was fourth, Narbonne fifth and Gardena sank into the cellar with no victories during the season.

Track and baseball are making almost a simultaneous entry in high school athletics. Coaches are getting their first looks at prospects for the cinder track and diamond sports and are not hazarding any speculations as to (1) their material; (2) their prospects in future competition, or (3) what their opponents lack or enjoy in candidates for time, distance, hitting or pitching honors.

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## Zamperini Fourth In First Indoor Mile of Career

Making his debut as an indoor mile runner, Louis Zamperini placed fourth, inches behind Archie San Romani, in the Knights of Columbus Mile, feature of the Prout Memorial Games in Boston (Mass.) Garden last Saturday night. The event was won by Chuck Fenske, University of Wisconsin graduate student, who defeated Glenn Cunningham. Fenske's time of 4:10.3 was the fastest of the season and only three-tenths of a second behind Cunningham's Boston record set in the 1938 Boston A. A. Games.

Zamperini, running unattached, was back in the race until the final lap. He made up a tremendous amount of ground, according to eastern press reports and was on San Romani's heels at the finish. Tommy Deckard was fifth, Blaine Rideout of Texas was sixth with John Munski of University of Missouri, seventh.

Next Saturday the Torrance runner is scheduled to appear in the Millrose games in Madison Square Garden, New York. On Feb. 10 he will return to Boston to compete in the Boston A. C. meet.
