Nearly 5,000,000 Gallons of Gas Burned Daily by California Motorists During '39

SACRAMENTO, Cal. — California motorists burned almost 5,000,000 gallons of gasoline every day during the year, 1939, to set a new record for the use of motor vehicle fuel, the State Board of Equalization reported today.

The actual consumption of gasoline for the 12 month period amounted to 1,810,768,366 gallons, or 4,961,009 gallons each day, board records revealed. This represents a gain of 5.27 percent over the previous year which, up to the time of the present report, was the highest in the history of the state.

The tax for last year amounted to a total of \$54,323,050.98, levied on the basis of three cents per taxable gallon and used for highway purposes throughout the state. The 1938 income from the source amounted to \$51,601,430.04, or \$2,721,620.94 less than for 1939.

And when he thus had spoken, he cried with a loud voice, Lazarus, come forth, and bound hand and foot with graveclothes; ... Jesus saith unto them, Loose him, and let him go. ... Passages from "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures" by Mary Baker Eddy include the statements: "It is not well to imagine that Jesus demonstrated the divine power to heal only for a select number or for a limited period of time, since to all mankind and in every hour, divine Love supplies all good. ... It is indeed adequate to unclasp the hold and to destroy disease, sin, and death."
