Airport in Lomita-Walteria Area Included in County's Master Plan

Manufacturing is particularly appropriate in this industrial district," the report concluded.

The Lomita-Walteria project was included in a comprehensive plan for future developments of airport facilities in every community in Los Angeles county, adopted by the Board of Supervisors after months of study by the County Regional Planning Commission.

One for Palos Verdes

Need for air transportation to the center of the city of Los Angeles prompted the Regional planning commission to recommend an airport for the new City of Palos Verdes Estates. Future development of small aircraft for private use, making private flying cheaper and more popular, would bring such an airport into great use, the report stated.

A site is proposed near the top of the rolling hills, which could be developed without unreasonable cost for taxi-plane service or for privately-operated individual craft. Cost of the site was estimated at \$50,000, while improvements could be installed for another \$261,850, the report said.

The recently-established Gardena Valley airport can be developed as a spacious Class 2 airport, principally for private and student flying, the report stated. It is used at present by the University of Southern California for student training under the CAA program. Drainage problems must be solved, however, and this involves drainage of Laguna Dominguez.

Proper Improvements

A well-developed airport at this site would solve the problem of private hangar space that will result from the transformation of Los Angeles airport into a transport line terminal, it added. The Gardena airport is south of Rosecrans avenue, and between Crenshaw boulevard and Gramercy place, but could be expanded south to Compton Blvd.

The city of Hawthorne has cooperated with the Northrop Aircraft Company to establish a new airport close to the factory, the city owning the landing strip, and the company the abutting land, under the plan. This airport is included in the master plan as a factory airport. Location of this field is between Prairie avenue and Crenshaw boulevard and adjacent to the railroad line that serves the factory.

Cost of improving this field is estimated at \$135,110. The eastern end of it lies in county territory, adjacent to the Inglewood city limits.

The Wilmington airport, al-

most surrounded by two arms of Bixby Slough, could be expanded to the west, away from its Figueroa street frontage, and to the south, the report stated. Cost of this expansion was estimated at \$280,000 for land and \$113,340 for improvements.

Needs Proper Drainage

The Western avenue airport, with a Class A rating, is only a short distance north of the Gardena Valley airport, and is subject to serious drainage problems which makes it undesirable in winter seasons.

Because of its proximity to the Gardena valley port, it appears that the district does not warrant two airports so close together, and was eliminated from the master plan. The commission recommended that the Western avenue field be brought back into the plan if proper drainage was provided for.

The program visions facilities for the use of 10,000 Los Angeles county owned airplanes by 1960 and involves an expenditure of approximately \$20,000,000 largely in Federal funds.

Two Seaplane Bases

William J. Fox, Chief Engineer of the Regional Planning Commission, in speaking on the airport development program, declared that the one thing which was retarding aviation was the lack of public facilities.

"Los Angeles County now produces 40 percent of the value of all airplanes manufactured in the United States," Fox declared. "These factories here employ 30,000 persons and have an annual payroll of \$49,300,000." The report also recommends two seaplane bases at Los Angeles harbor at a cost of \$1,100,000 and \$336,000.
