We both suffer from inferiority complexes. At first I thought I had acquired my self-consciousness in high school where I had flunked one subject, but I have since discovered that I inherited it from my mother. My husband has always blushed and doesn't seem to have inherited the condition.

You cannot imagine what a terrible affliction this is. It has affected me mentally and physically and has hindered both my husband and myself socially and will, I am sure, damage my husband's work. I have become such a nervous wreck that I do not accept invitations unless necessary.

We have a small daughter whom we want to prevent getting into our state of mind. Do you think this condition is inherited? How can we help her? How can we help ourselves?

MOTHER AND WIFE
ANSWER: It's so easy to slide into placing the blame for everything on heredity and then sit back and let things set. To be sure we cannot get tomatoes from pumpkin seeds or red roses from cabbage seeds, but we can get better tomatoes and roses than their heritage warrants by cultivation, breeding and brains. For you to say that your feeling of inferiority was inherited is plain nonsense. You were raised by a mother who had it and so quite naturally you acquired by contact, introspection, sensitivity and a feeling that everybody was looking at you.

People who have this feeling of inferiority have quite unconsciously, a most elaborate notion of their importance. They think that everyone is watching them and that they are the object of all eyes.

You and your husband lack social experience. You are not

sure of yourselves. Instead of hating to go out and refusing invitations you should accept all invitations and swing into line as fast as your practice lets you. You lose by retreating. Forward March!

EMOTIONAL BALANCE
It is a girl's letter that inspired me to write to you. I want to tell this girl that she will be happier if she does not join the "good times regardless" crowd. It does pay to be good. Stick to your high ideals and your ambitions; and, with pride, you will be telling your "used-to-be" friends of your good times. They will say: "Oh, why did I weaken and follow the gang to Whoopee Land?"

Wholesome recreation has a far-reaching influence, especially marked in adolescence, in helping to form emotionally balanced personalities. But, in some communities the young people of today are often unable to find any wholesome recreation that is within their means. They are forced to depend on themselves for social life because they are deprived of the informal support of their community.

HUGE JOB OF ASSESSING PROPERTY BEGINS MARCH 4

On March 4th, 425 deputy assessors will take the field to place assessments against all personal property in Los Angeles County. They are to complete their work by June 1 and expect to find more worldly possessions in Los Angeles county than ever before in its history.

Before the task is completed, the deputies will have made in excess of 800,000 calls upon homes, business houses, oil refineries and manufacturing concerns of various types.

County Assessor John R. Quinn estimates that 45,000 additional homes have been erected within the county since the last canvass and in addition there have been many new business enterprises and manufacturing establishments.

Will Call at Homes
Homes will constitute by far the largest number of calls while business houses will furnish in stocks and fixtures the largest valuation in personal property, Quinn said. A considerable addition to assessed values of airplanes also is anticipated as this industry has been speeded materially since the last visit of the assessor.

Deputies will call at homes and place assessments against furniture. In the event householders are absent a blank will be left for the householder to fill out and return to the assessor. A second call will be made if this blank has not been returned at which time the assessor will place an estimate as to the value of household goods.

Because of the increased volume of work about 40 more deputies will take the field this year.
