

Tartars, Gauchos Lose Opening Ball Games

With Jimmy Daniels turning in a good performance on the mound for the Tartars, Torrance defeated Narbonne 6 to 3 Tuesday at the city park diamond. Daniels allowed the Gauchos four scattered hits. Bill Hicks caught for the Tartars. Sion and Snyder, pitching for the Gauchos, granted nine hits to Torrance. Murphy caught. Fred Hicks, Torrance second bagger, and Clair Johnson, Torrance third sacker, shared hitting honors for the afternoon, getting two hits each out of three times up.

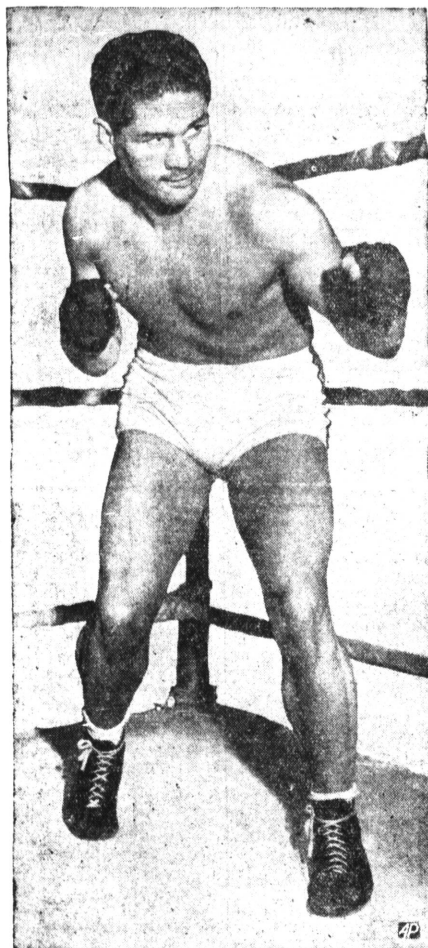

Sponsored by the National Wild Life Federation, the week's aim is education in fundamentals of conservation.

Zamperini May Fly East to Run in New York Event on Saturday

Sharing honors with Taisto Maki, Finnish soldier-runner, as the feature attraction of the special track meet held indoors at San Francisco Tuesday, Louis Zamperini won the mile with the ease of an old campaigner and returned at once to continue his studies at U.S.C.

The Torrance flash may fly east to compete in the Knights of Columbus meet in Madison Square Garden, New York, Saturday night where he would have his old rivals Chuck Fenzke, Glenn Cunningham, Gene Verske and others — as competition in an indoor mile. If he can make arrangements to miss a half-day of school and a weekend for studies he will leave tomorrow by plane, run in New York Saturday night and start his return flight immediately afterwards in order to be on the campus Monday morning.

On March 16, Zamperini will start his outdoor campaign by defending his two "legs" on the Frosty Martin trophy in the Long Beach Relays. This will probably be the last time the famed coast miler will be seen in action at the Long Beach meet and if he wins again he will gain permanent possession of the huge trophy.

Zamperini has accepted an invitation to compete in the Bankers' Mile in Chicago on March 23. This is said to be the oldest mile event in the history of U. S. track.

At San Francisco Tuesday, Maki made his first appearance in a series of races he will run in many parts of the nation for the benefit of the Finnish Relief Fund. Maki easily outstripped a local field at the bay city event to win the three-mile run in 14m. 15.3s.
