

Education Frills Under Fire of Co. Supervisors

Frills in education will be studied by the County Board of Supervisors following introduction of a resolution to the board by Supervisor W. A. Smith which urged school districts to use the utmost diligence in preparing 1940-41 budgets so that all possible economies are effected.

The resolution specifically mentions the teaching of china painting, flower arrangement, tapestry painting, Esperanto, radio, voice, badminton, chess, culture and other subjects termed luxuries in adult schools and declares adults attending these classes should be willing to pay for these courses from their personal funds.

Introduction of the resolution was the signal for an outburst from several supervisors desiring to air their views pro and con on the subject of "frills in education" and the matter was taken under advisement for later consideration of members of the board meeting as a committee of the whole.

Decide Tax Levies

After pointing out that the present is the time of the year when budgets are prepared and that these budgets decide the tax levies, the resolution states:

"Recent demands made by the State Board of Social Welfare will increase the amount of expenditures for relief in the fiscal year 1940-41 more than three-quarter million dollars; this expenditure being mandatory, it would therefore seem quite probable that the county tax rate could be decreased by any material amount and the only remaining budgets which could be decreased to give the common property taxpayer any material relief are those of the several school districts."

The resolution points to the criticism of adult education and declares that the City of Los Angeles spends more than \$800,000 per year in this type of education.

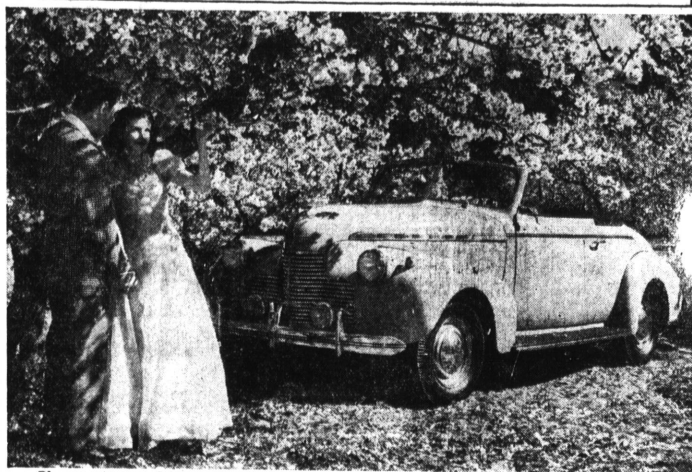
"The implication in the resolution is that school boards are including these items mentioned in their curricula and that they are frills," declared John Anson Ford. "I'm not prepared to say that they are."

Further Consideration
Supervisor Roger Jessup, board chairman, objected to dictating to school boards, subjects they should include in the studies in school districts.

"Yet the Board of Supervisors gets the blame for the high school costs, just the same," Supervisor Smith answered in defending his resolution.

Supervisor Gordon L. McDonough declared himself in favor of the resolution but was

Under Privileged Children Need More Play Areas

Greater participation by Los Angeles county in providing leadership and recreational areas for underprivileged children as a means of reducing juvenile delinquency and thus forestalling greater costs in crime prosecution in later years may become a policy of the Board of Supervisors, according to Roger Jessup, Board Chairman.

Jessup, on discussing the problem of delinquency among juveniles asserted the county could develop the Crystal Lake area as a place where children who did not belong to youth organizations and who constituted the real child problem, could go, under proper supervision.

It was pointed out that the Big Pipes area development had not been for the underprivileged but for the more fortunate children who were members of youth organizations with funds to participate in the development of recreational areas.

"The county should provide the leadership for these children and could cooperate with service clubs and other organizations desirous of doing a service for the underprivileged child. Such action would save the county large sums in later years," Jessup said.

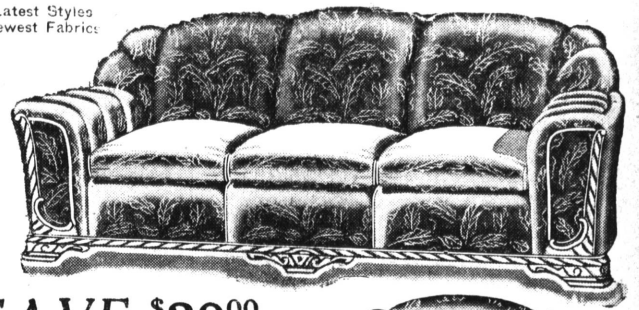

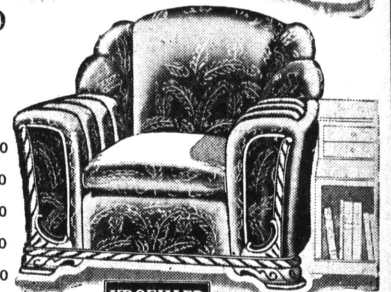

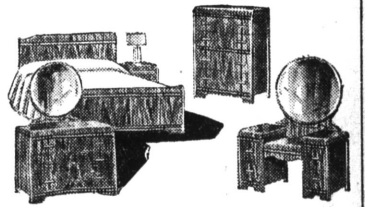
