LITERARY MUSIC GROUP TO MEET

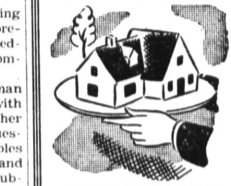
Mrs. Marie Morgan will entertain the literary-music section of Torrance Woman's club at her home, 2119 Arlington avenue, Wednesday, April 17.
