### Cafe "Raid" Pops Up Again Before Council

For the third successive council meeting the protest placed with the municipal board by Clifford King and Lee Hunt about the asserted "raid" on their Cabrillo avenue cafe early in March by Police Chief John Strohm and two deputy sheriffs came before the meeting held last night.

When asked by Mayor Tolson if he had notified King to be present at a hearing of the matter City Clerk A. H. Bartlett who said April 2 that he had instructed the complainant that the council would hear his and Strohm's story at a meeting held April 4 which was not attended by either King or Strohm, declared:

"I talked with King just before that meeting and I told him that I thought he'd better let it drop until after the election. He asked my advice and I told him that it wouldn't hurt him or do anybody any good. I have no personal feeling in the matter."

On motion by Councilman Tom McGuire, Bartlett was instructed to notify King the council would hear his side of the asserted disturbance at the April 23rd meeting of the council. Bartlett said he would so notify the complainant.
