## Must Get Permit to Sell Fireworks

The new state law on fireworks, which became effective last September, requires that a permit be obtained from the board of supervisors for the retail sale of safe and sane fireworks in the unincorporated territory of Los Angeles. Application for such permit must be made in writing to the Chief Fire Prevention Officer at 524 North Spring street, Los Angeles.

Spence D. Turner, county forster and fire warden, warns that failure to make application for a permit previous to engaging in such sale is a misdemeanor and is punishable by a fine or imprisonment or both. He urges that all those who plan to sell safe and sane fireworks make application for permit as early as possible at the above address.

## Maternal Mortality Rate in County is Under State, Nation

That the maternal mortality rate for the area under the jurisdiction of the Los Angeles County Health Department is substantially below that for the state of California and for the United States as a whole was revealed this week by Dr. J. L. Pomeroy, county health officer.

The maternal death rate (deaths from maternal causes per 1,000 live births) in Los Angeles County Health Department area in 1939 was 2.6. The state of California rate in 1938 (the last year which state figures are available) was 3.3, and the 1937 rate for the United States as a whole (the last figures obtainable on a national basis) was 4.9.

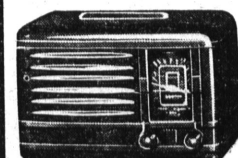

## SUPERVISORS GET P. V. PARK OFFER; WILL INSPECT SITE

Members of the Board of Supervisors tomorrow will personally inspect 1,800 acres of land in the Palos Verdes Rancho which have been offered to the county in exchange for cancellation of delinquent and current county taxes and special district taxes against the Palos Verdes corporation.

The land offered as a park site includes the summit of the Palos Verdes hills and approximately 1,800 feet of ocean frontage. Roughly, the proposed park site lies between the Metropolitan Water District reservoir and north of the Royal Palms clubhouse, which would make it easily accessible to both Lomita and Torrance residents, with a beautified parkway entrance on Vermont avenue.

The offer of the Palos Verdes corporation as read to the Board of Supervisors this week by Isidore B. Dockweiler in behalf of the Los Angeles county parks committee, includes:

1. Cancellation of the delinquent taxes, both general county taxes and for special tax districts, on the pro-

posed park area, amounting to \$37,715;

2. Cancellation of general county and road taxes of entire Palos Verdes Rancho, amounting to \$110,071; and

3. Absorption by the county of Los Angeles, thru appropriation from the general fund, of a percentage of the remaining delinquent taxes for the special tax districts, not to exceed \$125,000.

Proponents of the plan point out that since the Rolling Hills development, tax income on this portion of the Palos Verdes hills has increased eight fold; and it is estimated that the proposed park would be a great stimulus to further development which would mean still greater tax revenue.

## County Grants \$1,000 to V.F.W. Convention

Veterans of Foreign Wars had asked for \$2,000 of county funds to advertise their convention in Los Angeles this year. The sum of \$550 was recommended by the County Exploitation Committee but on motion of Supervisor Gordon L. McDonough, the Board allocated \$1,000 for the purpose.
