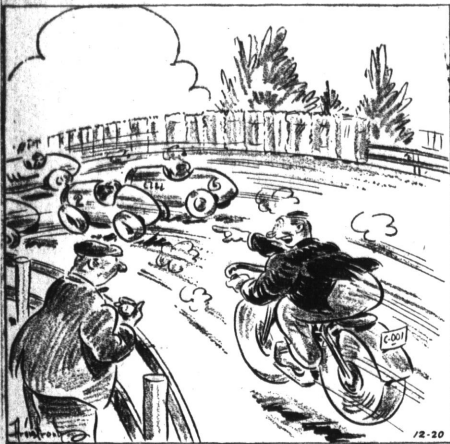

PRE-TOURNEY BALL SERIES STARTS MAY 14 AT PARK

Designed to work up interest in the California State Semi-Pro Baseball Tournament which will be held for the second year at the Torrance city park diamond beginning July 6, a series of night hardball games is being arranged by Dale Riley, Torrance recreation director and state commissioner in charge of the tour-

ney. The games are scheduled to begin next Tuesday night, May 14, at 8 o'clock with the Torrance-Lomita Indians, home club of the park, meeting leading squads of the L. A. association in night games each Tuesday and Thursday. The Standard Oil Refinery team from El Segundo will share honors with the Indians as home club in the series. The opening game, May 14, of the nocturnal hardball season

will pit the Indians against the Navy Field team from San Pedro. These squads battled last Sunday at Torrance, the Indians winning with a late-inning rally.

Double Handicap Spells Defeat for Louis In 2 Races

Handicapped by a stomach ailment, the result of ptomaine poisoning about a month ago, and a weak arch, caused from a fall during one of his eastern indoor races last February, Louis Zamperini was beaten by inches by Moore of Stanford last Saturday in the mile of the U.S.S. Stanford dual meet at the Los Angeles Coliseum.

He also placed third in the two-mile event which was won by the Stanford distance star. Moore's time in the mile was 4:11.3. Zamperini was unable to put on his usual sprint during the last 200 yards. Altho he is still under doctors' care, he is recovering fast now from his two ailments and in two more weeks expects to hit his old-time form.

Zamperini will enter the Fresno Relays next Saturday and will probably run the anchor (mile) lap in a race with the Stanford competitor, Moore, furnishing another thrilling classic.
