"THE CHANGING WEST" by

William Allen White: This book is unmistakably William Allen White—realistic but at the same time mellow-human and hopeful. Expertly written, the author has produced a penetrating character analysis of the people of the West, which may be found particularly challenging. "There is something in the book for every American, a challenge or an inspiration." Offered to an age of sophistication and science here is suggested the way out of present dilemmas.

An unusual book is "IN THOSE DAYS" by Prentiss

Mourian. Hiram Reynolds who died just the other day was 108 years old and possessed a fine memory. In his youth he heard tales of Revolutionary times direct from the lips of veterans who had served under Washington, Stark and Ethan Allen. In his own words he recounts many of these tales as well as those of life in those early days. We gain a fine picture of how rural Yankees lived, the daily customs and daily living. A most interesting picture for those who like a more or less authoritative vista of the past.

Zane Grey's "WESTERN UNION" is a lively yarn of the

untamed prairies. But it is also a chapter in the history of transcontinental communication. This was indeed a task, since their progress was challenged by "burning brush, raging rivers, blinding snow and hostile Indians."

"THE GOVERNMENT AT YOUR SERVICE" has been explained

to the average man by Archie Robertson in his book of that title. It is a practical up-to-date book that not only lists but describes and explains how to secure government services available both from Washington and from one's own community. Some of the subjects included are: government positions, health services, old age and social security, foreign trade and business helps, selling to the government, aid for farmers, handicapped children and adults, training schools and classes, immigration and many others.

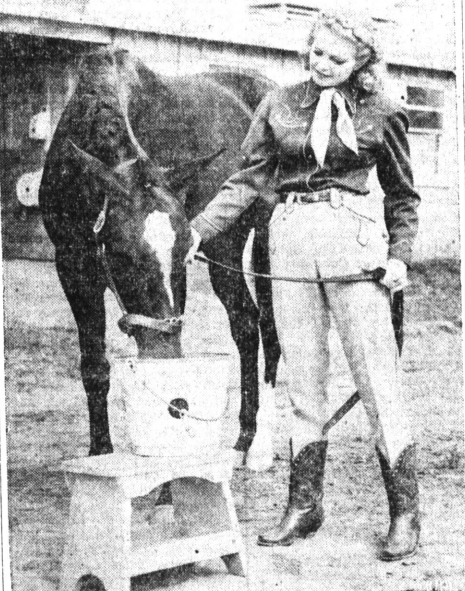
"JOURNEY PROUD" By Thoms-

Several units of the new sheet mill of Columbia Steel Company's Pittsburg, California, plant began operating this week, it was announced by company officials. The plant's old mill discontinued operation ten days ago to allow for the change over to new equipment, which was installed under supervision of Carl Warner, formerly of Torrance, plant engineer.

New units to start operating are a 3-high break-down mill, a pair furnace, 3 cold roll mills and the annealing department. Other units to start within one week's period include 2 new finishing stands and 2 new pack furnaces. Columbia's new sheet mill will not add to the present capacity of the plant but will insure improved products for Pacific Coast consumption.
