Factory Frolic to Incorporate as Non-Profit Community Enterprise

It will be "Torrance Factory Frolic, Incorporated." Decision by the executive board in charge of the third annual community celebration scheduled to be held Sept. 26, 27 and 28 to incorporate the event as a non-profit institution was ratified Monday night at a general meeting in the Chamber of Commerce.

Attorney John Shidder is drawing up the necessary legal papers prior to filing them with the Secretary of State. Other matters acted on at the general session this week were to appropriate about \$100 to provide prizes for the feature parade entries and \$50 for prizes to be distributed during the sports events. At the suggestion of Fay L. Parks, chairman of the 1939 Frolic, President Hillman Lee of the Torrance Retail Merchants Association will see if his members would be interested in having a booth in the "Frolic zone" where gifts from the retail business men of the city would be given adults.

Seek Wedding Principals... Unless another young couple offers to be the principals, the proposed public wedding, as a Frolic feature is off. This was learned from Mrs. Auguste Barnett who reported that the parents of a local girl who offered to be a public bride during the celebration had refused to give their consent to the event.

"I still think a public wedding would be a splendid addition to the Frolic program," General Chairman L. J. Gilmeister said. "We would be glad to receive applications from local people who are planning to be married late in September and would be willing to let the public be their wedding guests."

Vernon Coil reported that he is securing information on renting roller skates for outdoor skating during the three days of the Frolic and Dr. O. E. Fossum asked for suggestions from residents concerning the amusement features desired for the celebration.

A patriotic color scheme of red, white and blue was adopted for the coming celebration. It will be carried out in street decorations, bunting for the concession booths and aprons for the ladies which will be made by the Ladies of the Moose this year. Plans to exhibit industrial and mercantile products in the Auditorium have been abandoned and instead the civic building will be devoted to dancing all three nights of the Frolic.
