ORDINANCE NO. 318
AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TORRANCE DECLARING THE CLOSING UP, VACATING AND ABANDONING IN WHOLE OF A PORTION OF NEWTON STREET.

The City Council of the City of Torrance does hereby declare, determine and ordain as follows: Section 1. That proper notices have been posted and published as required by law giving notice of certain public works to be done under Resolution No. 1385 of the City of Torrance and that more than ten days have elapsed since the expiration of the time of the publication of said notice and no written objections have been filed thereto.

Section 2. That said public work to be done under said Resolution No. 1385 consists of the closing up, vacating and abandoning of a portion of Newton Street in the City of Torrance, County of Los Angeles, State of California, described as follows: The Northeast 12 1/2 feet of Lots 16 to 33 inclusive, Block 16 of Walteria, as per Map recorded in Book 17 at Pages 55 and 56 of Miscellaneous Records of Los Angeles County, State of California.

Section 3. That in pursuance of said Resolution and Notice of Public Works so posted and published, said portion of Newton Street described in Section 2 hereof is hereby closed, vacated and abandoned.

Section 4. The City Clerk shall certify to the adoption of this ordinance and shall cause the same to be published once in the Torrance Herald, a weekly newspaper printed, published and circulated in the City of Torrance, and thirty (30) days after final passage thereof the same shall be in full force and effect.

Aircraft Course Arranged for H. S. Students

In response to a demand by students for such instruction that will prepare them for jobs in the Southland's aircraft plants and also at the earnest request of personnel managers of those factories, Torrance high school will inaugurate a two-period course in aircraft sheet metal construction beginning with the 1940-41 term next fall, Principal Thomas H. Elson announced this week.

The course will follow an outline mapped by officials of the Douglas and North American Aircraft factories and it will be enlarged if the need arises to accommodate more than the 21 students who have been placed on a preferred list. About 55 boys recently indicated their interest in such instruction, Elson said, but new equipment authorized by the board of education will accommodate only about half of that number at the start.

"We are securing an air compressor for a riveting machine and other equipment," Elson said, "and Leonard Austin, our machine shop instructor, will be in charge of the new course. He has held a number of conferences with aircraft plant officials to learn just what they want in the way of trained boys for jobs during vacations and after graduation from high school.

"We have been assured," the principal continued, "that if our boys follow the aeronautical course straight thru they will be given preference for summer work, even including boys in the ninth grade, subject to age restrictions."

Last fall Principal Elson conferred with personnel directors of a number of Southland airplane factories to get their ideas on a training program. He then requisitioned the board of education for the necessary equipment to provide a basic course here. His efforts, during the past several months, have now succeeded.
