Rev. Roloff to Take Pastorate In Church Here

Rev. E. W. Matz, newly-elected district superintendent of Evangelical churches in California, announced today that he has appointed Rev. H. W. Roloff of Los Angeles as pastor of Central Evangelical Community church and Rev. Ben Lingenfelter as assistant pastor. The church, located at Marcelina and Arlington avenues, is one of the oldest in the city, having been organized and built in 1917.

Rev. Roloff has been serving as pastor at the Schaefer Memorial Congregational church in Los Angeles. He is a graduate of Pacific College in Seattle and has also studied at the Portland Bible Institute and the Graduate School of Religion connected with the University of Southern California, where he is continuing his studies for a master's degree in theology at the present time.

Rev. and Mrs. Roloff will reside at the Evangelical parsonage, 1543 Marcelina avenue, starting Aug. 1, at which time he will assume his pastoral duties here. Rev. Matz and his family will move to the Evangelical headquarters in Los Angeles by July 18. In addition to serving as superintendent of Evangelical churches in the state, Rev. Matz is a member of the general board of Christian education of all Evangelical churches in the United States and Canada.

His official duties will necessitate a trip to eastern points this summer and to the national convention and board meeting at Lake Koromis, Minn., Aug. 7 to 14.

With estimates indicating that the 1940 U. S. milk production may reach new highs, milk distributors are cooperating with other branches of the dairy industry to increase consumption of milk and dairy products.

Milk is the largest single source of farm income in the U. S. and last year it contributed \$1,355,000,000 in cash to the farmer, according to Edward Brunner of the Mayfair Creamery here.

When 25 million bottles of fresh milk are placed on the doorstep of American homes this daily service is so efficiently carried out as to be almost unbelievable to foreign milk exporters.

If consumers would drink an extra glass of milk every day during June, more than one billion more quarts would be consumed as fluid milk which brings the farmer his highest price.

It is estimated that one out of every 15 families in the country is dependent for its livelihood on the milk from 25 million cows, according to the Milk Industry Foundation, which says this fact alone warrants a determined all industry effort.

The milk distributors will cooperate with food, drug and variety stores, hotels and restaurants, civic clubs and schools, railroad, bus and airplane lines and milk producers to remind the consumer that the Milky Way is the American Way.

Window displays, advertising posters, fountain placards, pennants, truck banners and leaflets will feature milk. New "made-with-milk" drinks will be advertised by soda fountains. Activities will benefit dairy products, including ice cream, butter and cheese.
