



Bridge-Tender Has Paying Job But No Work

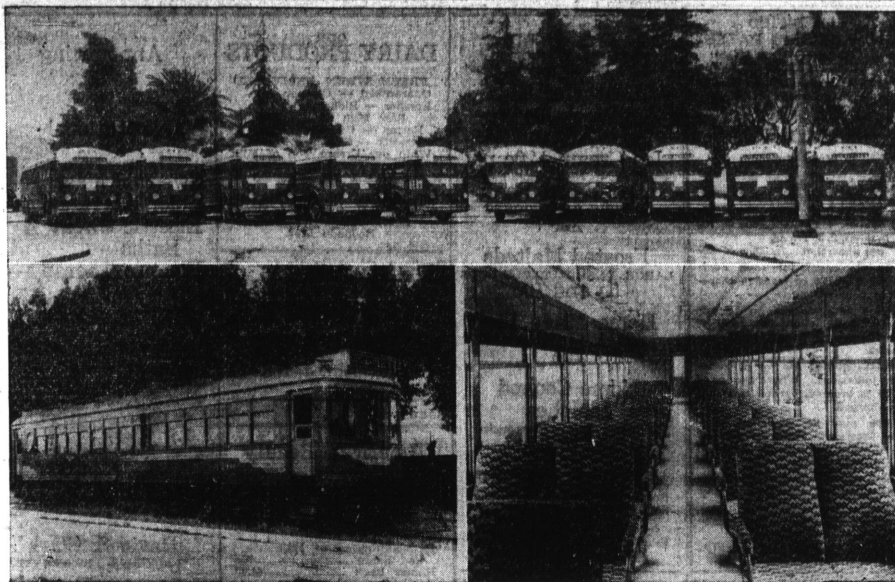

New Egg Labeling Law Goes Into Effect In California on July 1

Housewives will have a new, and more understandable, way of knowing exactly what they are getting when they ask for a dozen eggs after July 1. On that date provisions of a law requiring new quality designations for eggs will go into effect. Instead of the old trade terms, grades will be marked in order as grades AA, A and B.

Grade AA also may be advertised as "specials," but only A and B may be used for the old terms "extra" and "standard." There also is a grade C, but the housewife won't be buying it. Corresponding with the old designation "grades," grade C eggs may be used for manufacturing purposes only.

The remainder of a wholesale revision of laws governing the marketing of eggs went into effect last September, and the use of the new grade designations became optional at that

time to give the trade a chance to become accustomed to the change.

Rigid Size Standards

As explained by S. S. Rogers, chief of the state bureau of fruit and vegetable standardization, the new revisions give the most complete protection to egg buyers it is possible to devise.

There are rigid standards for sizes with only a two-cent variation allowed. Large eggs must weigh 2 1/2 ounces a dozen; medium, 20 ounces; small an even pound, and pewees are any size less than 1 1/4 ounces each. Cartons or packages of any size must be marked with the size and grade as well as the name of the producer and packer.

Another new provision compels the retailer to use the grade and size in advertisements, in type at least half as large as that used for the price.

The retailer also is prohibited from advertising cold storage eggs as "ranch" or "fresh" eggs.

IF NOT VICTORY by Frank Hough: In telling this story of the spark that kindled men's minds in 1776 the author portrays with keen understanding of human nature, things for which men live and die. LOVE IN THE SUN by Leo Walmsley: Possessing great charm, this is a book which will satisfy most readers. Through single direct statement we watch a man and his wife arrive almost penniless on one of the bleak stretches of the Cornish coast. They had no money but they did have love and courage. They rented a flimsy shack set in rocky soil and made a home of it—building, digging, planting. With garden and boat they began to wrest a living out of sea and land. The man looked back on what he had known and wrote of it where he could. Their life is strenuous but it breeds a deep content.

SEVEN GRASS HUTS by Cecile H. Matsch: This is the story of an engineer's wife in Central and South America. Like Mrs. Lindbergh, Mrs. Matsch had shared the hazards of her husband's profession and writes with gay humor the story of her nomadic life in South America. Alive to the strange beauty of the jungle; encountering regions where no white woman had been before her; sharing dangers and allure of the tropics, she lived their experiences that form the basis for a story of unusual appeal.
