## Third Round of Series Opens Tonight; Four Clubs Are Tied Up for Lead

With 11 clubs still in the race for the state championship, the California Semi-Pro Baseball Tournament enters the third round of play tonight at Torrance city park. Starting at 8:15 o'clock, the Long Beach Ellbees, undefeated in two previous tilts, meet Lockheed Aircraft, which has a 50-50 standing.

Leading the tourney, which started July 6 and will continue thru July 28, are the undefeated Pismo Beach Merchants, Wilmington Merchants, San Pedro Longshoremen and the Ellbees.

Five teams have been eliminated from the contest for the state title, a large gold trophy and \$500 to be used to pay part of the expenses in participating in the National Semi-Pro Baseball Congress games in Wichita, Kans., next month. These clubs have lost two games each: Torrance-Lomita Indians, Hartwell Aviation, Standard Oil Refinery, Pepsi-Cola and Gaffers & Sattler.

Now that the tournament is narrowing down the number of clubs, the attendance is expected to gain steadily. Pismo Beach has a sizable contingent of fans last weekend and promised to "empty the town" of the famous beach next weekend when they re-appear for two more games. Other teams are attracting good followings but the total attendance at the games is below the expectations of the Torrance Chamber of Commerce committee in charge of the tournament.

Fans are getting their money's worth at 25 cents per adult head—every night as the contending clubs do their best to stay in the running. Brief summaries of games played during the past week follow:

**Bankers Rally—And How!**  
An 11-run eighth-inning rally gave the Bank of America a 12 to 8 triumph over Standard Oil Refinery of El Segundo last Thursday night in one of the wildest games of the tourney.

Trailing thru the early frames, the Bankers started a hit barrage in the eighth that saw two pitchers chased from the mound. Matranza and Cuolo of the winning club rapped out home runs. The Bankers collected 14 hits while the Refiners got 13.

**Lockheed Crushes Trainmen**  
Santa Monica's Trainmen were no match for the hard-hitting Lockheed Aircrafters last Friday night as the plane builders went back to Burbank with a 17 to 1 victory to their credit. The game was called at the end of the seventh inning in accordance with a tournament rule that permits stopping a contest at that point when one team has an eight-run lead. Lockheed piled out 19 hits to the Trainmen's three. The Santa Monicaans used three pitchers trying to stop the Aircrafters.

**Pismo Looks Strong**  
Hartwell Aviation's youngsters were no match for the strong Pismo Beach Merchants who made their first tourney appearance Sunday afternoon. The visitors from the north won easily, 11 to 2, thus eliminating Hartwell, who had previously lost to L. B. Ellbees, from further series competition.

**Ellbees Take Rivals**  
Upsetting their home-town rivals, the Long Beach Ellbees defeated Long Beach Harbor Refinery, 5 to 3, Saturday night to become the first double winner of the round.

**Standard Oil Out**  
Pismo Beach continued its fine brand of snappy ball Sunday afternoon to knock out the Standard Oil Refinery from further tournament play. Pismo won, 7 to 6, thus cutting the field to 13 teams.

**Longest Game of Series**  
The longest game of the tournament to date finally ended Sunday night with Wilmington Merchants edging Dr. Ross Dog Food, 8 to 7. The three-hour 11-inning struggle was brought to a close by Ralph Mann's single, theft of second and third bases and run scored on an out-field fly. Wilmington used five pitchers while Dr. Ross had two on the mound.

**Pepsi-Cola Eliminated**  
Chet Relph's Chevrolet's pushed Pepsi-Cola out of the running Monday night, 2 to 0, the Pepsi having previously lost to Dr. Ross. A handful of fans braved the chilly night to see one of the best games of the series as both teams waged a close battle to stay in the running.

## New Army Units Hold Opportunity for Promotions

Unprecedented peace-time opportunities for promotion are being offered in the U. S. army with the establishment of scores of new units, it was pointed out this week by E. R. Otis, second lieutenant infantry-reserves, recruiting officer, Army Recruiting Station at the Long Beach postoffice.

With more than a dozen new units being organized at Camp Ord, near Monterey, to form the new Seventh Division and its auxiliaries, and with personnel to be drawn principally from western states, chances for non-commissioned officers' ratings are excellent for those who have had prior service.

ROTC, CMTC or high school graduates stand an excellent chance of advancing rapidly in growing organizations, the recruiting officer said.

**"Go Signal" Is On**  
A recent example of this occurred in a west coast artillery unit. One organization with a strength of more than 150 men was called upon to transfer 80 per cent of its soldiers to a regiment being activated. They were to form the nucleus for the various headquarters and batteries. Virtually all of the men transferred will be given ratings, many in the higher grades.

This procedure is to be observed throughout the vast army expansion program, assuring that ambitious youths enlisting with a desire to advance will find the "go signal" awaiting them at every turn.

With the approval of the California Horse Racing Board, headed by Jerry Giesler, Hollywood Park has been granted an extra day of racing and the proceeds of the day, after deduction of track operating expense will be divided between the Los Angeles County Council of the American Legion to be used for relief of disabled veterans of the World War, their widows and orphans, the Motion Picture Relief Fund of America, Inc., The Orthopaedic Hospital, and the League for Crippled Children.

The day will be designated as "American Legion Day" in honor of those who fought so valiantly in the World War, and the Motion Picture Relief Association will assist the American Legion in an attempt to make this the largest attendance of the summer meet at popular Hollywood Park.

All the top stars in the motion picture world are expected to flock to the track on July 22. Every notable in the motion picture world will undoubtedly be in attendance.

## Are You Getting Enough Salt?

Here is a bit of hot weather advice from County Health Officer, Dr. J. L. Pomeroy:

"On these hot days, if your work is such that it causes excessive perspiration and you begin to feel exhausted, add a pinch of ordinary table salt to each drink of cool water you take, and drink it slowly. This can be repeated as often as desired, and is both a preventative and corrective measure against heat exhaustion."

Stabilization of marketing conditions in the milk industry in the Los Angeles area, moved forward rapidly with the holding of the first meeting of the newly appointed Milk Producers Control Board and the election of William L. Houghton, Norwalk producer, as chairman.

"For the first time in recent years we in the milk industry have a definite program," Houghton declared in accepting the chairmanship of the board. "The present program is fair to producers, distributors and consumers, in that the producers are assured their necessary cost of production, the distributors a stabilized market, and the consumers a finer milk with a higher milk fat content."

The meetings of the board are conducted in the State Building and are scheduled for the last Thursday of each month. They are open to the public. Said E. L. Vehlow, State Department of Agriculture, who represented Director Parker at the first meeting:

"The meetings of the Milk Control Board will be designed to

\*carry out an educational program in connection with the milk regulations. The men chosen for membership on the board are experienced in this line, and from time to time will have invaluable advice to offer the director and his field workers."

## Children of Veterans Aided in Education by State Measure

SACRAMENTO (U.P.)—A little known activity of the Veterans Welfare board is the administration of the veterans' Dependents Education act, which provides funds for children of men killed in action or who died as a result of war service.

These children have received about \$280,000 under the act, with about 820 students participating. At the present time, about 300 youths have been approved for enrolling in institutions of higher learning throughout the state at the beginning of the next academic year.

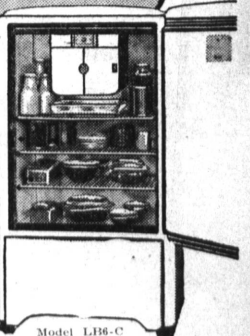
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
