Templeton and Thomas Due at Hollywood Bowl for Popular Concerts

Hollywood Bowl opens the second half of its 1940 season of Symphonies under the Stars Tuesday night, August 6, with soloists and conductors well known to the concert world.

Alec Templeton, brilliant young English pianist, will be on hand Tuesday night with a group of his original impressions and in addition will play the second piano concerto by Sergei Rachmaninoff. His concert will be conducted by Anthony Collins, English maestro.

John Charles Thomas, famed American baritone, comes to the Bowl Thursday night, August 8, for a program of favorite selections that have won popularity throughout the nation. He will sing arias from the grand operas "Don Carlos" by Verdi, "Don Giovanni" by Mozart and "Hercules" by Massenet in addition to a group of shorter numbers.

The Thomas program will be conducted by Albert Coates, British conductor well known to Bowl concertgoers. He will feature the American work "Victory Ball" by the late Ernest Schelling, and Brahms third symphony.

County May Lease Fast Car Fleet of Radio Patrol Cars

Leasing of a fleet of fast automobiles for radio patrol service in unincorporated territory is being considered by the county mechanical department, it was learned today. If savings can be effected, the plan may be extended to other departments.

The cars offered the county are more powerful than the present radio patrol cars, which now have 95-horsepower engines instead of 85-horsepower as regularly equipped. The larger engines have been found to last longer, and give greater speed to "the law."

New automobiles would be furnished at the end of 30,000 miles of service, and the company that has made the offer asks about 2.7 cents a mile. The county would have to install short-wave two-way radios, sirens, and spotlights, which county engineers figure would run the total cost up to about 2.85 cents a mile for 30,000 miles.

The company offers to furnish all operation and normal maintenance for the fleet at the price of 2.7 a mile, plus repairs due to accidents. Legality of the proposal is being investigated and the proposal is understood to be agreeable to Sheriff Eugene Biscailuz. Savings are expected thru salaries of mechanics in the county garage, and considerable bookkeeping incidental to buy-

SACRAMENTO (U.P.)—To eliminate the practice of hunters "going out for rabbits but returning with a bag of quail," the California fish and game commission has ordered a closed season on rabbit hunting in portions of four Southern California counties.

Counties affected were sections of San Bernardino, Riverside, Los Angeles and San Diego from Jan. 1 to Aug. 31. The new open season on rabbits, September through December coincides with quail season.

Keystone C.C. Demands Halt to Jalopy Racing on Avalon

Torrance is not the only community to have a "young speedsters" problem—Keystone is up in arms over the highly informal jalopy races which are being held at night on Avalon boulevard between Carson street and Victoria.

Keystone Chamber of Commerce directors this week instructed Secretary S. C. Sault to address a note of strong protest to E. Raymond Cato, head of the state highway patrol, over the recently expanded speed dashes which are endangering motorists using Avalon.

Undaunted by last week's raid by 20 state patrolmen, the jalopy drivers, nearly all of them boys in their teens, are said to be frequenting the "course" in greater numbers than before, Sault said. He declared that many drivers preferred to detour around Avalon than to compete with the "souped-up jalopies" reckless drivers.

In addition to the so-called "100 Miles An Hour" club, whose membership requirements reputedly ask that the applicant drive 100 miles an hour and successfully elude a

motor officer, the road is now used by several other similar youthful speed organizations from the Los Angeles area, Sault said.

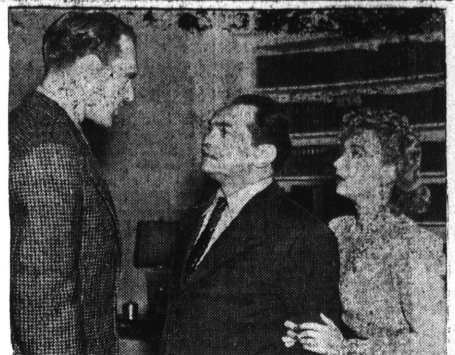
