Oil Worker Ends Life By Hanging

Despondent and morose, Adam Nagel, age 58, long-time employee of the C.C.M.O., Saturday evening ended his life by hanging, in his garage in the rear of his home at 18949 Redondo avenue.

Chief of Police Strohm, investigating the oil worker's death, disclosed that Nagel had been drinking quite heavily, and of recent weeks had been deeply despondent and often expressed his determination to end his life.

Chief Strohm was told by the man's wife, who was the first to discover the inert form of her husband dangling from a garage rafter. Police was summoned and a doctor who pronounced the man dead, by strangulation. Mrs. Nagel said she saw her husband about 7:30 o'clock that evening. He had said he was going out to the garage to do some work.

Body is at Stone and Myers Mortuary. Chief Strohm stated no inquest would be held.

Nagel was born in Germany and had been a resident of this country for the past 37 years.

Chief Strohm stated that undoubtedly Nagel had been despondent because he had failed to take out naturalization papers to become an American citizen and had worried over his status as an alien, dreading perhaps the possibility of being returned to Germany. His wife, Chief Strohm stated, said he had made no attempt to take out his first papers.

Funeral service for Mr. Nagel were held at Stone and Myers yesterday afternoon at 2:00 o'clock, with the Rev. Roloff of the Central Evangelical church officiating.

Private cremation followed at Pacific Crest.

He was rushed to a Los Angeles hospital where an operation was performed to remove a blood clot on the brain. Since the operation he has shown marked improvement, but a long period of convalescence must be expected, attendants pointed out.

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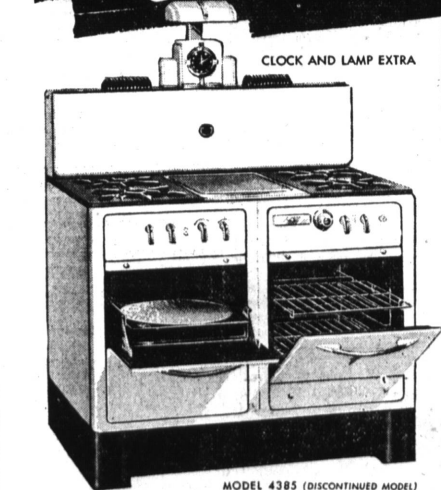
