

Local People Named on Advisory Group for County Housing Projects

Citizens prominent in social welfare, educational and philanthropic activities have accepted invitations to serve on a special advisory committee on selection of tenants for Los Angeles county low-rent housing projects, the County Housing Authority announced today.

The committee will consult with members of the tenant selection staff of the housing authority on problems connected with qualification of applicants for homes in the Carmelitos, Harbor Hills and Maravilla projects.

Five residents of this district have accepted invitations to serve on the committee. They are: Michael Strasser, city editor of The Torrance Herald; Miss Birda Paddock, city editor of The Los Angeles News; Jack L. Abbott, principal of Narbonne high school; E. M. Mosher, Lomita, and Mrs. Charles H. Cheney, Palos Verdes Estates.

First meeting of the county-wide committee will be held within two weeks, according to Eva Neal, supervisor of tenant selection for the housing authority. Present plans contemplate holding the meeting in a demonstration home shortly to be opened at the Carmelitos low-rent housing project, 5150 Atlantic boulevard, North Long Beach. The home is now being furnished attractively and inexpensively with the aid of the National Youth Administration and other organizations.

WPA Workers To Register for Defense Training

Registration of all WPA workers who possess qualifications necessary for employment in national defense activities or aptitudes for training in defense work is now being undertaken throughout the nation, Herbert C. Legg, WPA Administrator for Southern California, announced yesterday.

"Work records of more than 2,500,000 persons on or awaiting assignment to WPA rolls are being combed for skills and potential skills which can be turned to productive defense channels," Legg said. "Approximately 35,000 workers on WPA rolls in Southern California are being classified and registered in a Defense Industries Employment Register, which will show either the skills at which they are proficient or for which they can be trained. Workers already qualified are available for immediate employment, while those requiring additional training are subject to enrollment in special vocational training courses now being offered cooperatively by WPA, the Office of Education and Defense Advisory Commission."

The employment register will show the number of WPA employees in each state qualified or potentially qualified for 130 industrial occupations designated as important to the defense program, based on their WPA record and their previous employment record. WPA recently allocated \$468,000 for training of 5,000 workers in Southern California in defense subjects, and classes have been started in several counties.

Personal Injury Suit Dismissed

The \$7,000 damage suit brought by Mrs. Katherine Mawer against Mrs. Dolores Schaffer of Paradise Hut was heard before Judge Baird in superior court Tuesday with judgment awarded to Mrs. Schaffer, the plaintiff receiving no damages.

Two years ago on Aug. 17 a large "horoscope" party was held at the Paradise Hut, many guests being present and extra help being employed. A year later Mrs. Mawer brought suit against Mrs. Schaffer alleging that at that dance she had fallen and suffered a compound fracture of the bones above the ankle.

According to the plaintiff she was given no help but left, went to her home in Redondo Beach and called a doctor who set the leg the following day.

According to the records of the Hut no one was reported injured nor was any guest or employee aware of an accident. Witnesses for Mrs. Schaffer were guests who were present at the party and employees on duty that night. Mrs. Schaffer states that the plaintiff, who was at the time of the accident, Katherine Lenihan and married later, was not known to her.

No evidence was introduced to prove that the injury was suffered at Paradise Hut and the judge ruled that if the plaintiff had slipped and fallen on a slippery dance floor no damages were due as it was at the risk of the individual that a person danced, there being no evidence that the floor was broken or unsafe for ordinary dancing.

Livestock Valuation in County Reported

Valuation of dairy cattle in Los Angeles county is placed at \$1,999,450 in the annual report of County Assessor John R. Quinn to the state board of equalization, it was learned today. Field deputies found a total of 72,836 head in the course of their rounds this spring.

Horses, most of them of riding breeds, are valued at \$850,990, or slightly more than \$100 apiece for the 8107 head. The assessor also reported 24,757 head of sheep, valued at \$48,555.

Swine totaling 26,404 were found on hog ranches and in a few back yards, with a total valuation of \$78,895. In other back yards the assessor found 1598

goats which were valued at \$6485. Poultry and turkeys still are reported by the dozen, instead of by the head. Los Angeles county, which supplies more than a million eggs a day to the egg-eating and cake-making population, had 85,700 dozen chickens valued at \$138,366, and 707 dozen turkeys valued at \$2,563 when the field deputies made their rounds, the report showed. The poultry and turkey figures are those for ranches only, and do not include the back-yard flocks of individual property owners. It was explained by Assistant Assessor John Hartman.
