## WPA Starts Work On Pine-Hawthorne Storm Drain Project Monday

Three hundred and seventy WPA workers began construction work Monday on the \$186,508 Pine-Hawthorne storm drain being sponsored by Los Angeles county, according to Herbert C. Legg, WPA Administrator for Southern California.

Designed to relieve the drainage and flood problems in the area bounded by Hawthorne boulevard, Lennox avenue, Prairie avenue and Hardy street, the project is a unit of the country-wide drainage improvement program being carried out by the WPA, and will require five months for completion. Federal contribution for the job was \$181,221, with the county supplying \$35,285.

## Game Bird Season Opens October 16

The waterfowl season in California has been set as Oct. 16 to Dec. 14, with shooting hours from sunrise to 4 p. m. Dove season this year is from Sept. 1 to Oct. 15, except in Imperial county, which will see shooting from Oct. 1 until Nov. 15. Shooting hours are from sunrise to sunset, with a limit of 12 birds per day and 30 per week. Duck hunters must purchase Duck Stamps at any Post Office, validate and affix them to the back of the State Hunting License.

## Call State Legislators for Third Extraordinary Session of 1940

SACRAMENTO (U.P.)—The third extraordinary legislative session of 1940 was assured this week with the announcement of Republican leaders of the senate and assembly they would call the lawmakers back to Sacramento on Sept. 21.

Like the two previous sessions this year, the new meeting was called primarily to vote new funds for the state relief administration.

The supposedly final settlement of the relief question at the extraordinary session of last May budgeted relief funds by quarters. However, S. G. Rubenow, Gov. Culbert Olson's new SRA director, convinced members of the joint committee investigating relief matters that the funds for the present quarter

will run out before the middle of this month.

The committee has recommended an appropriation of \$1,450,000 for the remainder of the month, when a new quarterly allotment will be available. SRA officials complained that the legislature will meet after the relief treasury has run dry, but it believed that money from the governor's emergency fund will be loaned on the promise that new money will be voted.

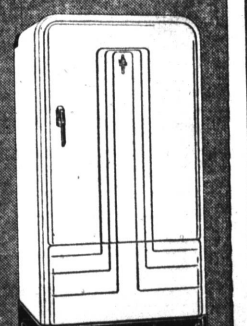
Olson announced also he would ask the legislature to appropriate money for the activities of his recently-appointed state council on defense. In spite of the addition to the agenda, Senate President Pro-tem Jerald Seawell estimated the legislature's business could be completed in one day.

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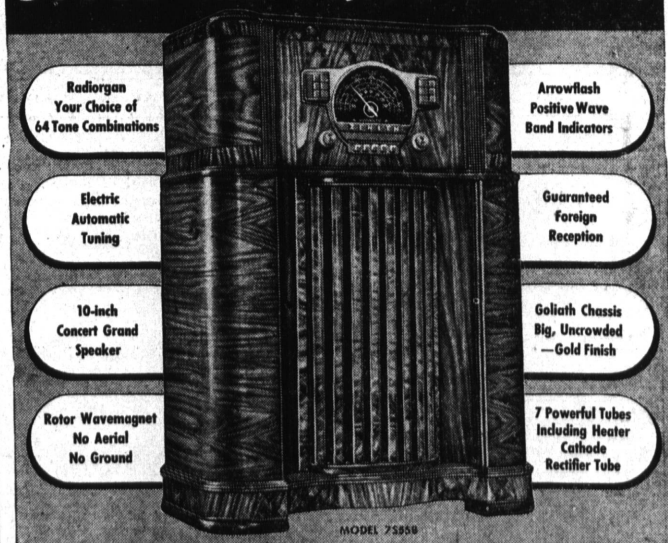
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
