Torrance HOSPITAL Serves Wide Area

Institution Accredited Nationally

Now in its 13th year of dis-tinguished community service, Jared Sidney Torrance Memorial hospital is more than a \$150,000 institution-it is a Torrance landmark of hope and health to thousands who have had occasion to use its facilities, employ its staff of 35 people. A gift from the city's founder and heirs, the hospital has kept pace with the forward advance of medical science

It is certified as one of the 2,620 institutions in the United States and Canada approved by the American College of Surgeons and is also endorsed by the State Board of Health. As a member of the Associated Hospital Service of Southern California it offers group hospitalization insurance to local workers.

Framed in a park-like setting of lawn, shrubbery and flowers on an elevated portion of Engra-cia avenue, Torrance Memorial hospital is managed by an attentive board of directors head-ed by Mrs. J. S. Torrance, president, Dr. J. S. Lancaster, vice-president; Donald Findley, secretary, and Mrs. Dorothy Jamieson, treasurer. Members of the board also include Mrs. Minnie Brooks, Dr. A. P. Stevenson, E. M. Barber, R. R. Smith and Grover Whyte. These men and women represent the membership of the Torrance Hospital Association to which anyone may belong

Erected at a cost of \$100,-000 and equipped at an additional expense of more than \$35,000, the hospital was opened in May, 1925. It is located on a knoll off Engracia avenue. Mrs. J.

S. Torrance, president of the Torrance Hospital Association, and the board of directors have, with the assistance of a splendid staff, maintained the institution on a high standard. Much credit for this record is due Miss Esther Z. Maxwell, who has been the hospital's superintendent from the day it opened. The hospital has consistently received superior merit rating from official and professional groups.
