The governor said all but eight of the lawyers selected for the advisory boards were nominated by the State Bar association. They will serve without pay and act as contact men between the draftee and the appeal boards.

The local board is meeting today at its headquarters in a bungalow at Narbonne high school, preparatory to assigning numbers to all men who have registered. The assignment will start tomorrow afternoon after all the registration cards have been carefully checked and then thoroughly shuffled. The numbers will start at one and progress up to (if necessary) 4,500. Officials in Washington will select the numbers for the national draft probably on Oct. 21.
