The force of the impact ig-nited the gasoline tank of the truck and the driver, Raymond Smith of Alhambra. legged to safety. His swamper, Wallbrook followed suit and landed in a pool of flaming gasoline from which he was saved by Neufeld. The burning gasoline ignited brush on unoccupied farmland and flames raced over more than five acres before the blaze was brought under control by firemen from Van Nuys and North Holly-wood. 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



SACRAMENTO (U.P.) - Cali-fornia's three percent sales tas has a per capita yield of approx-imately \$14 a year—the highest of any state with an administra-tive cost of only 219 percent of total collections, lower than that of any other state. T. H. Mugford, chief of the sales tax division of the state board of equalization, attributes this record to greater retail buy-ing in California than in most other states and more effective collection.
