STIMULATED BY the problems they faced in rebuilding war-ruined faces, plastic surgeons have advanced by leaps and bounds in knowledge and technique since the World War. Today, writes Ruth Murrin in the November Good Housekeeping, an unshapely nose may be completely remade in the short space of a week's time.

Since the nose is such a prominent feature, more people are sensitive about them than any other feature. A deformed nose, she says, attracts the eye so that other pleasant normal features go unnoticed. Under these circumstances, it may be a handicap to both social and business success. Plastic surgery, therefore, has come in for a great deal of public attention, and surgeons all over the country are successfully remodeling thousands of ugly noses. Their results bring new personalities as well as fresh faces.

If you are planning such an operation, Miss Murrin advises a thorough check on the surgeon. Make sure she warns that you are in good health—no cold, sinus or skin difficulties to make complications. In most cases four or five days in a hospital are all that is necessary. After the operation there is a slight scar which completely vanishes in three or four weeks. Pictured below are two examples of actual cases. Notice with what great skill the noses have been reworked.
