Strong Arm Advantage
To a casual reader there is no apparent harm in the proposed current ordinance. But on closer analysis there is no actual benefit to be derived from the enforcement of the law, except the one you have indicated in your letter—to assist in the recovery of stolen guns in case of theft or burglary.

I do not believe that it is the proper function of the police department to retain extensive records describing personal property. There is no more reason for this purpose than there is for them to retain a record of the number of binoculars, cameras or other photographic equipment.

The benefits of such an ordinance to the city would certainly not offset the expense of administering the ordinance. But most important—think of the advantage the possession of such a list would give to a strong arm organization of the Storm Troop variety when they depiced to take over control of your municipal government. Altho this possibility may sound farfetched at the present moment, this technique has been used with success in nearly every European country within the past few years. We don't want it to happen here.

The city of Torrance should not adopt an ordinance of this type.
