Two Speedy Dinners And How To Make Them

Be it ever so simple, dinner served on time tastes better than a banquet that is late. For those days when time presses it is a good idea to have on file menus and recipes that you can turn out in a jig time. I'm suggesting two hurry-up dinners below, together with management notes of the kind that make meal-getting less of a dash.

(All Recipes Tested by Good Housekeeping Institute)

Use Institute-approved measuring cups and spoons—

Measure level

Current Lamb Patties

Buttered Whole Carrots

Heated Canned Potato Sticks

Bread Pickles

Steamed Canned Fig Pudding

Lemon Sauce

Milk for All

You can make the Lamb Patties in the morning, and store, covered, in the refrigerator. Scrape the carrots, and place in vegetable crispener or refrigerator bag. At the same time, heat the sizzling platter until a drop of water will sizzle on surface—about 20 min. in very hot oven (450° F.). Place the Current Lamb Patties, cooked carrots, and potatoes, which have been heated in the oven for a few minutes, on the sizzling platter. Serve at table with bread, butter, and pickles to protect the table. Heat the Fig Pudding following manufacturer's directions on the label. You can, if you wish, make a lemon sauce in the morning and reheat it to serve. Or you may prefer to use hard sauce on your pudding, which can also be made early in the day.

Current Lamb Patties

1½ lb. shoulder lamb, ground twice 1½ tsp. pepper
1½ cup bread crumbs 1½ tsp. bottled condiment sauce
1½ cup minced onion 1½ tsp. butter or margarine
1½ cup salt 1½ cup instant jelly

Combine all ingredients except butter and jelly. Brown the patties in butter in a skillet. Add jelly, cover, and cook over low heat for 15 min. Turn once. Serves 4 to 6. To serve 2, make ½ this recipe.

The night before, cook the sweet potatoes in their jackets; put in refrigerator. Then you need only peel and slice them into ¼ crosswise slices for supper. Or use cold leftover boiled sweet or white potatoes, slicing as directed above. To make Russian Dressing, just add 2 tbsp. chili sauce to ½ c. mayonnaise. You'll naturally want your lettuce chilled, so, the night before, wash it and put it into refrigerator bag or vegetable crispener. Put your can of kidney beans in to chill at the same time. Certainly the soup course is not a problem, for a can opener does that trick. We'll bet that your husband will want you to make the Broiled Stuffed Frankfurters often. You won't mind—they are easy to do.

Broiled Stuffed Frankfurters

8 frankfurters 2 large, cooked sweet potatoes
1½ cup. Swiss cheese 2 tsp. butter, margarine, or salad oil
2 sp. pickle relish

Slit frankfurters 5 min. Drain and split lengthwise, almost all the way through. Cut cheese into 8 narrow lengthwise pieces; then insert a piece in each frankfurter. Top each with 1 sp. pickle relish and shower together with toothpicks. Peel potatoes, and cut in ¼ crosswise slices. Arrange potatoes on broiler rack, and broil for 10 min. Turn with fat, and broil for 10 min. Place frankfurters on rack with potatoes, and broil with fat. Broil for about 2 min., or until cheese is melted and frankfurters are browned. Serves 4. To serve 2, make ½ this recipe.

Dorothy Killgallen Defies Jinx On Girl Reporters

ONE of the favorite dreams of American youth, both male and female, is of themselves as illustrious members of the working press, in other words, as reporters. That few of the thousands who have such dreams ever get inside a city room, much less rise above run-of-the-mill work, seems to be no deterrent at all. They dream on. Once in a while there is an exception and such an exception is Dorothy Killgallen, the "Voice of Broadway" on the New York Journal-American and the only girl Broadway columnist.

Miss Killgallen has been in "the racket" a scant ten years. Daughter of the famous reporter Jimmy Killgallen, she got her first break one June day ten years ago when she went to work on the New York Evening Journal for \$20 a week. Louis Sobel, writer of Manhattan Cavalade, tells the story of her career in the February issue of Cosmopolitan Magazine. He remembers:

"The boys in the city room of the Journal when she first went to work for the paper nicknamed her Mickey Mouse.... When she brought in two startling news beats on successive days, someone nicknamed her half in derision, half in admiration, the Girl Wonder. She has been the Girl Wonder in the opinion of her fellow workers ever since."

Miss Killgallen started the hard way by "covering" the morgue and within two years was competing with the country's best journalists on straight news. At twenty-three she competed in an around-the-world race with two other reporters and became the first woman to fly across the Pacific in a passenger plane and the first woman to fly around the world.

In her ten years, Miss Killgallen has risen from an average yearly wage of \$1,000 a year to approximately \$20,000. She goes to work in a chauffeured limousine and has a private secretary and a personal office boy.
