Children entering first grade who have not attended kindergarten may be admitted if they will be six years of age on or before May 3, 1941. A new rule adopted by the Superintendent for admission of beginning pupils takes effect this semester. This makes it obligatory on parents to present a birth certificate or recognized proof of age for children entering kindergarten or first grade for the first time. Documents which will be accepted as proof of age consist of birth certificates, baptismal certificates, anally Bible record, passport or an insurance policy over two years old.
