#### **Increased Taxes Will Hit Cities** Hard, Report

Any boost in the general county fax levy would be felt severely by taxpayers in some of the cities of the county, where increases in tax rates also loom, it was pointed out this week.

Los Angeles city budget experts are hoping to avoid an increase in the general city tax rates, but an increase looms for the Los Angeles city school district, one of the largest district in the world.

This week it was disclosed by City Manager Carl R. Erickson of Long Beach that his budget for the port city would call for an increase of eight cents per \$100 of assessed valuation. This would make the rate 99 cents, or just one cent short of the \$1 tax limit, it was explained.

Public hearings on the county budget for next year began Monday at the supervisors' meeting room.

#### Alondra Park Camp Said Temporary

Assurance has been given by Col. Wayne Allen, chief administrative officer for the county, that the use of existing S. R. A. buildings in Alondra Park by unemployed single men on the county rolls will be only temporary—for about a year. This answer was given Tuesday to protests filed with the county supervisors by civic groups and residents in Gardena and vicinity of Alondra Park.

Allen, in a letter to Secretary Pat MacDonnell of the Gardena Velley Chamber of Commerce, said that "continuation of the use of Alondra Park facilities is designed as a temporary measure only to house the type of individuals who could perform certain light work in connection with improvement of the park. This is not designed to be permanent and the county contemplates moving these (S. R. A.) buildings when the work to be performed has been completed, i. e., when the park is available for use as a park and playground—estimated approximately a year from date."

At the supervisors' meeting Tuesday the protests were briefly mentioned and Supervisor Oscar Hauge said he was in accord with the objections. However, he pointed out that the matter would have to be ruled on by the county counsel and he would be governed by an applinon from that official.
