

Mme. Bellini Opens Summer Piano Classes Here On July 1

Mme. Teala Bellini, concert pianist and teacher of piano, will open her summer season July 1. Mme. Bellini has been teaching piano for 27 years and has taught in Torrance for 17 years. She was on the faculty of the Julius Hart School of Music in Hartford, Conn. for five years and since coming out here was artist teacher at Saint Mary's Academy, seasons 1928-1929. She has had her own studio in Los Angeles since 1929.

James Francis Cooke, editor of the Etude, says: "No instrument invented has contributed so much to social and material progress as has piano, because it coordinates the mind and the nervous system as does no other known study. It accelerates the action of the brain to lightning-like thinking and educates the mind to quick accurate judgment." Music encourages self-expression, self-confidence and develops personal charm and individuality. It is an acknowledged fact that piano students who have had a thorough musical foundation do better in school and college and learn faster and more easily than the average.

Mme. Bellini adopts the new and proved ideas in piano study and her students are known for their lovely tone quality, excellent articulation and fine technique. Her students are trained in stage presence and, in addition to their study of piano, are given classes in theory, harmony, ear training, transposition, music history and music appreciation. At the end of the season a "musical quiz" is held and a prize given to the winner. This year's winner was Richard Davis.

Mme. Bellini accepts beginners as well as advanced students and has many students using professional work. She took five years specialized teacher training and child psychology study and was for many years a pupil of Julius Hart, internationally known teacher of piano. She was his assistant teacher for three years before coming to California. She made her debut as a concert pianist in New York City at Aeolian Hall in 1920. After her debut she concertized extensively throughout the East, and since coming to California, she has played before leading clubs and organizations throughout Southern California and as far north as Fresno.
