Motor Registration Near 3 Million Mark

Motor vehicle registrations during the first five months of 1941 approached the three million mark, the department of motor vehicles reported.

The department said that 2,899,917 vehicles of all types were registered during the period, a gain of 215,968 over registrations during the same period of the previous year.

LOGANBERRY CHIFFON PIE REAL TREAT

By MARJORIE H. BLACK Please the men in the family and serve pie for dessert. The recipe for pie given below does not require a hot oven to make it. In fact it is made with crackling crumbs and a gelatin mixture. It is so easy to prepare and always looks festive and tastes especially good.

Loganberry Chiffon Pie 1 cup graham cracker crumbs 3 tablespoons melted butter 1 tablespoon granulated gelatin 1/2 cup cold water 1 1/2-cup. can loganberry juice 1 cup sugar dash salt 2 tablespoons lemon juice 1 teaspoon grated lemon rind 1 cup whipping cream 1 egg white

Mix together the crumbs and butter and line a 9-inch pie pan with it. Soften the gelatin in the water for 5 minutes and dissolve over hot water. Add to the fruit juice and sugar; stir until sugar is dissolved. Add the salt, lemon juice and rind. Chill until it starts to congeal. Whip a half cup of cream and fold it and the stiffly beaten egg white into the loganberry mixture. Pour into the crumb lined pie pan and chill until firm. Whip the remainder of the cream and spread over the top of the pie. Sprinkle a few crumbs over the top and serve.

This foundation recipe may be used with any one of the many canned fruit juices, or combinations of juice, or combinations of juice and pulp that are available today, or you might like to combine two or more juices for a blend of flavors.

This would make an excellent dessert for a Sunday dinner, and the rest of the meal might include tomato juice to start with, then broiled lamb kidneys, creamed potatoes and peas, spiced peaches, and artichoke salad. With the exception of the kidneys, most of the foods are available in cans and that will make the meal an easy one to prepare.
