Flood control and county road departments have accumulated \$177,283 as the county's sharp while the PWA will be asked to put up \$1,768,960. The project will be requested as a national defense measure because in times of heavy rains flood wat-ers threaten Main street, Nor-mandie 'Avenue, Figueroa street and Vermont Avenue, main traf-fic arteries leading from Los Angeles to the harbor. Trucking of national defense materials to and from the harbor make it necessary to keep these main highways open throughout the petition. Flood waters really start at Los Angeles Municipal Airport and stream down thru Gardena, spreading out in the Keystone and Dominguez Hills areas, ac-cording to county engineering surveys.' The drainage project has been sought by Harbor Dis-triet Chambers of Commerce the past two years.
