COUNCIL SESSION STRICTLY BUSINESS AFTER FIVE MONTHS OF POLITICAL "FIREWORKS"

For the first time in five months — since April 3 to be exact — the city council meeting last Thursday night was devoted strictly to business with no "fireworks" of any kind interrupting the steady flow of civic action from the time Mayor Tom McGuire announced the opening pledge of allegiance to adjournment.

The session, attended by only a few spectators, was a welcome relief from the bickering, arguments and speech-making that turned the last dozen or more meetings into a political free-for-all.

Mayor McGuire, Councilmen James Hitchcock, Vern Babcock, George V. Powell and Kenneth H. Kall, the latter two being seated Tuesday night following canvass of the results of the Sept. 10 special election, will meet again next Tuesday night, Sept. 23. Business transacted last Thursday night by the three-man council which had been serving since July 29 when Powell and John V. Murray were recalled, included the following:

CHURCH SEEKS QUARTERS
Because their church was almost totally destroyed by fire last Thursday afternoon, officers of the Wateria Full Gospel church appealed for the use of the Wateria Recreation building as temporary quarters. No other building in that community was available, they reported. The request was granted, subject to approval of the Recreation department.

WITHDRAW "HOLD" ORDER
Informed by the Huntington Land and Improvement Co., that installation of underground conduits for additional street lighting in Hollywood Riviera was "utterly impossible at the present time" for financial reasons, and by the Southern California Edison Co., that the question of whether underground or overhead installation should be permitted there was not the province of either the city or the power company, the council withdrew its request to the Edison Company to hold up the installation. Overhead lighting, under a power pole, was proposed several months ago by Hollywood Riviera residents who asserted they purchased homesites understanding that underground con-

ducts would be installed. The land company's president A. G. Walker, informed the council it was no longer interested in the beach tract, that Clifford F. Reid and F. W. Marlow were the developers. Walker blamed the depression for halting the planned development of the tract and stated that the operators now must sell the land, keeping the cost of improvements to a minimum in order to escape any further tax delinquency.

BUS SERVICE LIMITED . . .
A copy of the order of the Los Angeles Board of Public Utilities limiting the Torrance municipal bus system to picking up passengers south of the intersection of Manchester and Hoover was filed. City Attorney John McCall reported this was the second time the Los Angeles board has handed down such a limitation despite the city's effort to allow Torrance buses to pick up passengers as far north as 69th st. He said the city has never stipulated that Los Angeles has any right to limit the Torrance service, however, the municipal system will abide by the ruling.

TERMINAL RENT WANTED
Having purchased the property at 945 South Hill st., where Torrance municipal buses have their northern terminus, the Los Angeles Railway Corp. notified the council that rent on the property due since July 10 is now demanded. The communication did not mention the rental fee and no action was taken by the council on the demand.

TWO LOTS SOLD . . . Two adjoining lots on Gresham blvd. (Cedar st.) north of Torrance blvd., were purchased at the tax sale auction which has become a regular feature of council sessions since the city acquired title to delinquent properties by two brothers-in-law, Robert B. Trezise bought Lot 17, Block 89, and Earl Clayton purchased the next lot north—both sales for \$350 each. The purchasers were accompanied at the meeting by their father-in-law, Dean L. Sears. Frank M. Krewok offered \$600 for six lots on Bonder ave. off Post ave. He was informed that the city's minimum price for each of the lots was \$175 and the offer was rejected.
